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Itula warns against unsustainable election pledges

The leader of the Independent Patriots for Change (IPC), Panduleni Itula has cautioned political leaders against making promises that they cannot deliver on. Itula made these remarks on Wednesday during a panel discussion on Namibia's economy from a social



protection perspective at the Namibia University of Science and Technology's hotel school in Windhoek.

Itula, who is the IPC presidential candidate for the elections in November, specifically discussed the increment of the old age pension grant and the introduction of a social grant that the government promised to give to each unemployed Namibian between the ages of 18 and 59. Vice-president and Swapo presidential candidate Netumbo Nandi-Ndaitwah

has promised to increase the pension grant from the current amount of N\$1 600 to N\$3 000 if she is voted into power, a promise first made by late President Hage Geingob. During the discussion, Itula stated if Namibia is going to consider introducing a universal basic grant to

Swapo electoral college urged to prioritise inclusivity and competence

The ruling Swapo party is preparing for its electoral college, also known as the 'pot', where delegates will choose the next group of 96 members to represent the party in the National Assembly from 2025 to 2029. Over 650 delegates are expected to attend the electoral college, which will take place from 7 to 8 September in Windhoek. Swapo veterans Nahas Angula and Helmut Angula have recently made a public appeal to delegates attending the Electoral College. They urged them to prioritise competence, inclusivity, and diversity when selecting candidates. According to political columnist Paul Shipale, who agrees with these seasoned politicians, the party must elect individuals who can genuinely represent the country's diverse population.

"I, therefore, agree with Swapo seasoned politicians and veterans, Nahas Angula and Helmut Angula, who urged the delegates to the Swapo Electoral College to look for candidates who can represent the

party in the National Assembly and represent the broader populace in terms of competence, gender, the country's demographic, economic status, the youth, the poor and marginalised, etc," he said.

Despite the strong calls for unity and competence, rumours of factionalism loom over the upcoming electoral college. According to Shipale, there are whispers of internal plots to oust older members in favour of younger candidates. "I hear that there are rumours of long knives out to stab others in the back, including plots to oust the older generation from the contest, similar to what happened in the Popular Democratic Party (PDM) when the youth out-manoeuvred older politicians and kicked them out of the central committee. The danger with such a move is that the government will have no institutional memory from an experienced and competent crop of politicians," Shipale warns. He further warns of the risk that factionalism could undermine Swapo's ability to present a united front. Shipale urged the delegates to avoid factionalism and focus on building a leadership team that reflects

Namibia's diversity and is committed to the country's transformation agenda. "I implore all those who are going to attend the Swapo Party electoral college to desist from the above practices and avoid factionalism of the 'neo-liberal' vs. 'the radical transformation' factions or 'the older generation of Baby Boomers and Gen X' vs. 'the newest generation of the born-free or the Gen Y or Millennials and the Gen Z' factions," he said. Swapo critic and chairman of Namibia's National Society for Human Rights, Phil yaNangolo appeals to the delegates to watch out against hibernating infiltrators and other dormant subversive elements who are against Swapo and its presidential candidate, Cde Netumbo Nandi-Ndaitwah. "Most of these destructive elements are well known by or through their social media and other public or private conduct," he said.

opposition political parties that would grab votes due to their activism," he said. Johannes believes that the decision to deregister the NEFF was a calculated political move to delay the NEFF's participation in the November elections. He compared the matter to the previous issue of ECN failing to use EVMs with vilification papers, questioning the body's full trust. "Where had this passed them? Now the commission just opened a case, which it lost, showing that it might have failed to comply with the law, which is supposed to protect and exercise independently," he said. The NEFF deputy leader, Kalimbo Iipumbu, said they are back on the ballot. "After an intense and prolonged legal process, the High Court of Namibia, presided over by Honourable Judge Thomas Masuku, has ruled in favour of our party, reinstating NEFF to its rightful place on the ballot box," he said. The High Court also ordered ECN to pay the legal costs. NEFF and the Christian Democratic Voice (CDV) party were deregistered

in June for reportedly failing to submit and publish their financial statements. Both parties' seats were withdrawn from the National Assembly upon their deregistration. Despite this, Iipumbu insisted that political figures with a stake in ECN were pushing the deregistration narrative. He said the party lost over N\$450 000, which was meant to be used for the party's activities. According to Iipumbu, the court's decision reinstates the party's status and upholds the fundamental principles of justice, democracy, and the rule of law for the Namibian people. "This is a victory for every Namibian who believes in fairness, transparency and democracy," he reiterated. Our fight was never about reinstating the NEFF as a political party. It was a fight for the integrity of our democratic institutions and the constitutional rights of every Namibian," he added. He said that the case helped them realise that ECN is not their enemy but rather an institution with which the party should interact positively.



According to Iipumbu, NEFF did not deny complying with the ECN, contrary to what some media reported. He noted that some other political parties only submitted and published their report after NEFF was removed from the ECN list. "The issue was the timing. We had

no total control over the auditing firms that audited our papers. We cannot also force them since we were to ensure fairness, transparency and accountability with our documents," he said. Iipumbu expressed his frustration and questioned why the ECN had violated the law by allowing Parliament to function without their seats. He commended the judiciary for upholding the rule of law and delivering a judgement that genuinely reflected the spirit of justice. "The High Court ruling has paved the way for us to continue our work, and we intend to honour this opportunity by redoubling our efforts to bring about the transformative change that

our nation needs," he said. At the same time, Iipumbu urged those who had left the NEFF to return, following the correct channels established by the party. "We are not going to force anyone to come back. For as long as they have interest in the party, we will not reject them," he said. The ECN spokesperson, De Wet Siluka, said the commission has learnt of the judgement delivered and orders granted but is still revising the reasons. "The commission is busy studying the reasons contained in the 51-page judgement and will in due course pronounce its position on the ruling," he said.

Lawmaker warns divorce rate could soar if new bill makes separation easier

Paulus Mbangu, a member of the National Council, warns that once the proposed Divorce Bill becomes law, the divorce rate will skyrocket, making it cheap to divorce.

This, he said, is despite the fact that divorce is currently expensive.

Mbangu made this statement on Wednesday while participating in the National Council's debate on the Divorce Amendment Bill.

"My concern is if the divorce rate skyrocketed when marriage dissolution was expensive and difficult, what will happen when dissolution of marriage is made easy and less expensive?" he said.

According to Mbangu, in 2018, it was reported that nearly 1 297 divorces were finalised in Windhoek, while about 1 422 cases were filed the following year, of which approximately 862 were finalised.

"The High Court roll on 25 April 2022 recorded 119 divorce cases. The leading cause of divorce in Namibia is abusive and cheating husbands and a lack of affection between couples.

Some divorce can also be attributed to selfish individual interests among couples who enter these unions to get

something out of it," he said.

He added that the bill doesn't say anything about the marriage period restrictions in the context of spousal maintenance, as it is essential to consider the broader implications and ensure that any rules established promote fairness and equity to both parties.

According to him, a shorter marriage should not qualify for spousal maintenance because the need for support is less compelling in shorter marriages, and longer marriages may result in higher expectations than shorter ones.

"While spousal maintenance is meant to provide support, it can be subjected to potential abuse. A spouse may choose not to seek employment or work part-time, claiming that it is impossible to support themselves. This can be a strategic choice to rely

on spousal maintenance rather than contributing to their own financial independence," said Mbangu.

He further explained that one spouse might inflate their financial needs or present unrealistic pictures of their expenses to secure a higher amount of maintenance than is fair or necessary.

"If the woman has sacrificed her career to be a wife, spousal maintenance makes sense. Paying spousal maintenance to a spouse who betrays you knowing that there is another person in her life could potentially complicate it, our courts need to be vigilant. Courts should periodically review spousal maintenance arrangements, allowing either party to request a reassessment if they believe there is an issue of misuse and abuse," proposed Mbangu.

give to everybody, then leaders should consider the country's population, which stands at over three million.

According to Itula, the basic grant should be above the poverty line of N\$1 180, which will result in the government giving out N\$42 billion from its coffers.

"This year alone, we collected N\$ 78.6 billion. If you have a universal basic income grant, you have already depleted half of the money you have collected.

However, if you are saying you are only going to give to those who are above the age of 18, we have got 1 731 790 people above the age of 18 in Namibia. If you are only giving those ones, you will be dishing out N\$24 billion.

Now the N\$78.6 does not include the SACU contributions, so when we make those policies, we must cause them.

We need to make absolutely sure the promises we make will be physical. And if not, it's immoral and an insult to the dignity of the electorate to promise them something we cannot deliver," said Itula.

He added that if the government decides to increase the old age pension grant, people should keep in mind that there are 24116 beneficiaries, according to statistics, and it will cost N\$8 billion. He also stated that he is not against the proposal.

He questioned if the government could afford it.

"I have visited over 500 villages across the country, and that is when

I established the social needs and national interests. So leaders need to be very factual and objective in what they are proposing and also avoid emotional approaches to the problems because it can be very dangerous to promise something that is not there," cautioned Itula.

The discussion also focused on what citizens should expect in political party election manifestos this election year. Political analyst Ndumba Kamwanyah, who was part of the panel, said the public needs to compare political parties' current manifestos to previous ones, especially those of the ruling party, and see which promises have been achieved and which ones have not been achieved.

"What we have observed from previous manifestos is the gap between manifestos and reality, mainly on empty promises due to unfulfilled implementations," said Kamwanyah.

Another political analyst, Rui Tiytende, said Namibians don't have a reading culture, so they don't bother to demand manifestos from their political parties to know what they will be voting for, and political parties are taking advantage of that.

"That is a fundamental problem we have in Namibia. How are you going to assess the intention of a new party or even the old ones if you don't read?" he questioned.

Social activist Rinaani Mushutua said it is sad that the government is using social protection issues for elections, when the implementation date gets close, it's postponed further to years ahead.

"We keep wondering why the implementation plans are being prolonged into the future when people are really struggling now and they need those grants now," she stated.

Mbumba urge Africa to learn from China's rapid industrialisation

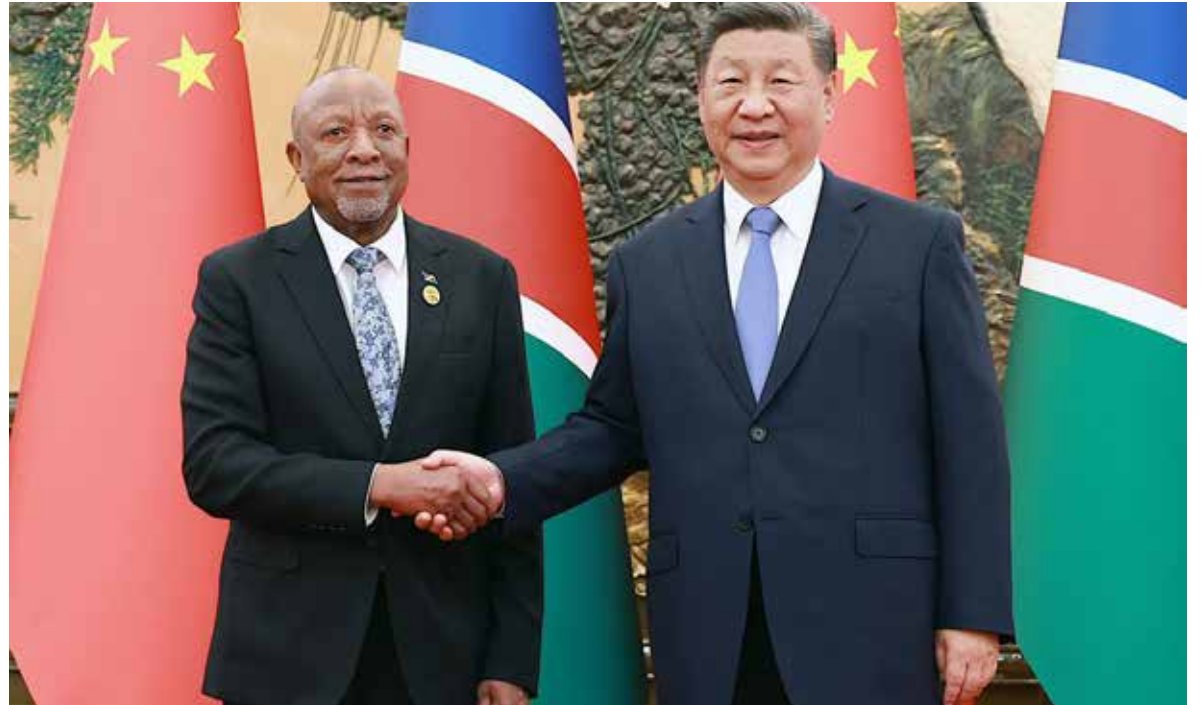

China's industrialisation has been rapid and Africa, given its relations with the country can draw valuable lessons from its development trajectory. President Nangolo Mbumba while addressing a high-level meeting at the ninth Forum on China–Africa Cooperation (FOCAC) summit in Beijing, China, on Thursday said that industrialisation should also be viewed through the efforts of international institutions, including the United Nations (UN). The UN has the collective responsibility to address international challenges and come up with solutions that could help countries achieve industrialisation and agricultural modernisation. "In this regard, I am specifically referring to the upcoming UN Summit of the Future, which will be co-facilitated by Germany and Namibia this month during the 79th United Nations General Assembly. The Summit will adopt the Pact for the Future, which is also expected to address gaps in ensuring industrialisation and modernization on an equal footing, under the Sustainable Development and Financing for Development sub-section," he said. The summit is being held under the theme "Industrialisation, Agricultural Modernisation and

Green Development: Routes to Modernisation". Mbumba added that the adoption of the pact will further reaffirm existing commitments, by UN member states, including to the sustainable development goals and the United Nations Charter, and move towards a reinvigorated multilateral system better positioned to impact people's lives positively. "It should also be noted that there can be no sustainable industrialisation without addressing the reforms of the international financial architecture. Mobilising international finance should be made easy and accessible to assist developing countries achieve their National Development Plans and ensure the collective realization of the

Sustainable Development Goals by 2030," he urged. Mbumba further added that agriculture is the biggest employer in many African countries. Therefore, investments in modern equipment, tools and technology are essential to boost productivity and to secure livelihoods. The sector remains a top priority in Africa and is necessary for food security and nutrition, for the well-being and

development of people. "Our country, Namibia, is arriving at ensuring food self-sufficiency for its people in the crops subsector. In order to support and encourage local production, the Namibian Government plans to establish agro-processing centres all over Namibia, particularly in the rural areas, for youth, cooperatives and farmers in general, to add value to our agricultural produce, develop

new products, contribute to economic activities in the remote areas, and stimulate economic growth," he told delegates. Further, alluding that for these centres to be a success, Namibia needs to acquire affordable small-scale technologies, equipment and tools. Therefore, cooperation with the Government of China in this regard is welcome.



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Namibia secures N\$730 million for green hydrogen future

Tom Alweendo, the minister of mines and energy, said continuous investment in the country's green hydrogen projects strongly contradicts the belief that the development of a synthetic fuel industry in Namibia is merely a pipe dream.

Alweendo made these remarks on Wednesday at the Global African Hydrogen Summit, where Team Europe signed an agreement to contribute N\$730 million to advance Namibia's green industrialisation agenda.

"Some people think we are going too slow, but we are also trying to go systematically to ensure we achieve what we need to be achieving," Alweendo said.

He said that the country reaches significant milestones each year in advancing its green industrialisation agenda.

"There are still people who think this is just a pipe dream, which will not happen in some years. But I think all these milestones that we are achieving every year... I hope more people are convinced that we are getting somewhere. This is real," he added.

Alweendo explained that the funds will help Namibia progress with its green industrialisation strategy. While the country has abundant resources, it lacks financial capacity, which is why the partnership with Team Europe is essential.

According to him, the funding mechanism would support reforms in legislation and improve the country's policy actions, but it will also be directed toward building the necessary infrastructure to bring the green hydrogen project to life.

"It is very satisfying to see that we are addressing all the pieces that we have set in this program to make sure that one day, not too far in the future, we can say, yes, Namibia has made it," he said.

The European Union Commissioner for Energy, Kadri Simson, affirmed that the funds reflect the EU's commitment under the Global Gateway Strategy and Team Europe's support for Namibia in achieving the late President Hage Geingob's vision of becoming a global hub for green hydrogen production and a leader in the global decarbonisation effort.

She highlighted that these initiatives mark key milestones in implementing the strategic partnership on green hydrogen and critical raw mineral value chains, signed in 2022.

"They will reinforce our commercial relations in the green hydrogen and critical raw materials sectors, increase employment opportunities in Namibia, and help both Namibia and the EU

undergo their green transitions," Simson said. She said the significance of Namibia's collaboration with European partners in advancing sustainable energy, accelerating the green transition, and creating quality jobs for Namibians in these sectors.

German State Secretary Jochen Flasbarth noted Namibia's significant potential to lead Africa's renewable energy transition.

"We are honoured to support this vision through the EU-GET transform initiative." We are committed to supporting Namibia in its own energy transition and helping it play a significant role in the rapidly growing global green hydrogen market," Flasbarth said.

He said green hydrogen will play a critical role in the global economy's green and sustainable decarbonisation.

James Mnyupe, Namibia's Green Hydrogen Commissioner, said the support from EU partners will drive the development of Namibia's green hydrogen industry and contribute to broader goals of economic diversification, green industrialisation, and creating sustainable jobs for the country's youth and beyond.

ECN prepares officials for November elections

More than 130 regional electoral and returning officers from all over the country have converged at Swakopmund, where they are undergoing an eight-day training in preparation for the November elections.

Elsie Nghikembua, chairperson of the Electoral Commission of Namibia (ECN), said during the official opening of the training session on Thursday that the training is a crucial part of preparations for the upcoming elections.

"These elections will not just be a test of our administrative capability

but also an opportunity for us to reinforce public trust in our electoral process. Each one of you has been selected for your experience, your dedication, and your unwavering commitment to our core values," she told the participants.

Nghikembua stressed the importance of the training, describing it as essential to reinforcing public trust in Namibia's electoral process.

She added that the November elections are expected to be a further test of the commission's administrative capabilities.

"Each election presents an opportunity for our people to express their aspirations for the future through the leaders they choose," she said.

According to Nghikembua, the

"Negligence in the discharge of duties could lead to penalties as outlined in the Electoral Act No. 5 of

2014," she warned.

Nghikembua also pointed out the complex challenges that may arise during the election process, from logistical issues to political dynamics.

She, however, expressed confidence in the abilities of the officers and encouraged them to work collaboratively to address any obstacles.

"Communication is key," she said while also stressing the importance of teamwork in strengthening the electoral framework.

She praised the electoral team's hard work and resilience during the recent General Registration of Voters (GRV), hailing it as a significant success.

"The success of the GRV was not without its challenges, but the

dedication and professionalism of the officers for navigating these hurdles and maintaining the integrity of the process should be credited," Nghikembua said. Reflecting on a post-mortem review of the GRV conducted by the ECN, she revealed that the purpose of this review was not only to celebrate achievements but also to identify lessons learned.

"This approach is a demonstration of the Commission's commitment to continuous improvement, ensuring that future elections are handled with the utmost efficiency and transparency," she said.

She said that the training session is clear evidence that the ECN is well on its way to preparing for what promises to be a critical election in the country's history.

Oshikoto struggles with high number of vehicle accidents

The Oshikoto regional governor, Penda Ya Ndakolo, has stated that while combating crime remains a top priority in the region, the high incidence of road accidents is also a significant concern.

Ya Ndakolo shared this during his State of the Region address last week.

"Our police and other key stakeholders are working tirelessly for our safety and to prevent crime. However, the high rate of road accidents continues to be a cause for concern in our region," he said. Ya Ndakolo said that, during the reviewed period, there were 207 crashes, 452 injuries, and 49 deaths. He said reckless and negligent driving was the primary cause of these accidents.

"I, therefore, implore our drivers to adhere to the rules and regulations of the road," he urged.

Ya Ndakolo added that the region has progressed in reducing severe crimes and speeding up

investigations due to intensified crime prevention strategies.

Despite this, the governor expressed disheartenment to note that crimes such as rape, assault, housebreaking, theft, negligent driving, and culpable homicide are among the top ten crimes in the region.

"The region remains committed to fighting crimes against women and children. However, it is regrettable to note that gender-based violence increased from 12 percent the previous year to 20 percent. It is noted that the greatest cause of gender-based violence is alcohol abuse," he stressed.

Ya Ndakolo understands that crimes are a societal problem that requires a society-wide response.

He has since urged the public to work with the police to ensure safer communities.

In a similar report, the Oshana police only recorded four vehicle accidents, one fatality, and six cases of drinking and driving during the past long weekend.

Two weeks ago, the state sentenced Jandre Dippenaar to 15 years in

prison for a murder case involving a culpable homicide that resulted in the deaths of six people in 2014. Dippenaar became the first person in Namibia's legal history to receive a murder conviction following a fatal motor vehicle collision.

According to road safety activist Felix Tjzongoro, the judicial system has shown increasing seriousness in addressing road accidents by holding individuals accountable in ways that reflect the gravity of the consequences.

"The severity of the sentence sends a clear message that reckless behaviour on the road will not be tolerated, particularly when it leads to the loss of life. This case is particularly notable because the crime was classified as murder rather than a lesser charge, marking a significant moment in the country's legal approach to road safety," he said.

He also commended the courts for demonstrating their commitment to road safety by holding cattle owners accountable for accidents caused by livestock roaming freely on the roads.

Tjzongoro said the court's decision to fine communal farmers for damages caused by their livestock is a powerful reminder that road safety is a shared responsibility.

"Together, these cases illustrate a broader trend in Namibia's judicial system towards stricter

enforcement of laws related to road safety. Whether it involves imposing heavy fines on cattle owners or long prison sentences for reckless drivers, the courts are increasingly focused on ensuring that those responsible for road accidents are held accountable," he said.

Police introduce new directives for traffic law enforcement

The Namibian Police introduced a series of new traffic law enforcement directives aimed at improving road safety and increasing trust between the public and law enforcement officers.

These measures, outlined in a circular issued on Thursday by the Inspector General of the Namibian Police, Lieutenant General Joseph Shikongo, stress the importance of visibility, fairness, and discretion in traffic law enforcement practices.

The directives come in response to numerous complaints from road users regarding unsafe practices by some traffic officers, particularly those rushing into roads to stop vehicles or positioning speed traps in concealed locations.

Shikongo said that these incidents have caused concern among the public, leading to near-misses and raising questions about the safety and transparency of traffic operations.

“In light of these issues, the need for a more visible, transparent, and equitable approach to traffic law enforcement is vital for improved service delivery,” he said.

One of the key directives focuses on the compulsory use of high-visibility reflective jackets by traffic officers, especially those wearing camouflage uniforms.

The directive mandates that officers wear these jackets at all times while on patrol or when conducting speed measurements.

This measure is intended to enhance officer safety and reassure the public

of their presence, reinforcing public trust in law enforcement efforts.

Another important directive involves the correct placement of speed-measuring instruments, which must now be positioned no more than

three metres from the road’s edge. This measure aims to ensure that officers can safely operate these devices while reducing the risk of accidents for both officers and motorists.

Officers have also been instructed to avoid concealing traffic enforcement vehicles behind shrubs, culverts, or trees, a practice that has been criticised for undermining transparency and encouraging non-compliance among drivers. Shikongo’s new directives also include a call for increased patrols on national roads, with a focus on shaping driver behaviour through proactive engagement rather than punitive measures.

“Officers are encouraged to issue courtesy notifications or warnings for minor infractions where appropriate, rather than imposing immediate penalties,” he said.

According to Shikongo, this approach is intended to create a more cooperative relationship between law enforcement and the public while also promoting education and voluntary compliance over punishment.

A key aspect of the new directives is the equal treatment of all road users. Shikongo reminded all officers of their duty to apply the law uniformly, ensuring that all individuals are treated fairly, regardless of their status or background.

“This is a fundamental step towards upholding justice and fairness in traffic enforcement,” he said.

The directives also address the maintenance and proper use of government-owned vehicles, including police vehicles.

Shikongo instructed the various unit commanders to enforce regulations regarding the roadworthiness of all vehicles, ensuring that they were systematically inspected, repaired, and maintained.

He also addressed the misuse of state-owned vehicles.

“Allowing unauthorised persons to use state-owned vehicles or neglecting maintenance, will lead to disciplinary actions,” he said while also reiterating the importance of accountability within the rank and file of the police.

Shikongo said that these new operational directives should be accepted as a shift in the approach to traffic law enforcement in Namibia, which should also reflect a commitment to improving road safety, increasing public trust, and ensuring fairness and transparency in law enforcement practices.

He added that the implementation of the new measures aims to enhance the overall effectiveness of the police’s traffic law enforcement operations in order to create a more positive relationship with the public.

At the same time, Shikongo encouraged road users to comply with traffic laws and cooperate with officers at all times to ensure that tragedies on the country’s roads do not occur.

Zuma’s daughter marrying polygamous king ‘for love’

The 21-year-old daughter of South Africa’s former President Jacob Zuma is marrying the Eswatini king for love, a spokesman for Africa’s last remaining absolute monarchy has told the BBC.

Nomcebo Zuma’s engagement to King Mswati III was made official earlier this week at the end of the eight-day reed dance ceremony - a traditional rite of passage for young women and girls held every year.

The 56-year-old monarch is currently in a polygamous arrangement with 11 wives - and has been married 15 times in total.

Eswatini spokesman Alpheous Nxumalo dismissed outright the suggestion that the marriage would be a political alliance.

“Love has no eyes to see or count age. Love happens between two people.

It can happen between a person who is 100 years old and a person who is above the average of what is permitted constitutionally,” he told the BBC’s Newsday programme.

Mr Zuma, who was president of South Africa from 2009 until 2018, and King Mswati are already relatives through marriage.

Critics accuse King Mswati, who rules by decree and has been on the throne for 38 years, of living in luxury with his polygamous household - while most of his people languish in poverty. Eswatini, previously known as

Swaziland, has a population of 1.1 million and one of the world’s highest rates of HIV/Aids infection.

The heavy-handed treatment of the king’s opponents in Eswatini, which is almost entirely surrounded by South Africa, has also come in for criticism.

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Rich countries are paying poorer ones to manage their refugee crises: 3 reasons this is dangerous

In recent years, western nations have been sending asylum seekers who arrive at their borders to other countries.

This is a practice known as offshoring. The UK has become the recent poster country of this practice.

The UK, whose plan to send asylum seekers to Rwanda was later scrapped after domestic and international opposition, has continually manufactured a perceived asylum threat. This led to slogans by the UK government such as “send the boats back” and “stop the boats”.

The European Union (EU) has struck several controversial deals with African and Middle Eastern countries to stop asylum seekers from reaching European borders. Since 2017, the EU has been funding Libya to stop migrant arrivals in Europe. It struck similar deals with Tunisia in 2023 and Mauritania in March 2024 to curb migrant flows. These agreements are helped along by the EU Pact on Migration and Asylum, which is the union’s strategy to outsource migration management to other nations.

Australia pioneered offshoring by sending asylum seekers to Nauru, a small island nation in the Pacific Ocean. This began in 2012.

The Rwanda plan was emblematic of the emerging border governance strategy. First proposed by then-prime minister Boris Johnson in April 2022, the plan intended to send upwards of 50,000 asylum seekers to Rwanda from the UK.

The plan essentially approached governing and managing asylum seekers and refugees as commodities who can be shipped like goods from country to country.

We are scholars of refugee rights and public policy, as well as global supply chain governance and human rights. We have been following how western governments have created a new form of refugee governance. Just as they once outsourced production, the dumping of e-waste and plastics recycling, they have been seeking to hand over to developing countries the problem of refugee processing and governance. This approach is flawed, too. It opens the door to human rights abuses and the propping up of authoritarian regimes in developing countries, and is expensive for western countries under the guise of humanitarianism and “solving” so-called migration crises.

Bad policy

The numbers of refugees and forcibly displaced people are surging. This has been brought on by climate change-related disasters, political repression, socioeconomic insecurity and group-based persecution. All these factors are intertwining with mounting anti-immigrant sentiment.

As a result, refugee offshoring remains on the radar of policymakers tackling so-called problematic immigration in Europe. For instance, 15 European Union (EU) countries are calling for migration and asylum processes to be outsourced.

It’s also no surprise that the Rwanda plan gained so much traction with right-wing politicians in Europe given that the populations being excluded are often migrants from Africa and the



Middle East.

In our view, offshoring asylum seekers is cruel, inefficient and overall bad migration policy.

Understanding the risks Human rights abuses: Offshoring is premised on denying asylum seekers a right to claim refuge. It encourages the enactment of restrictive and inhumane migration policies, and treats asylum seekers as commodities. This subjects them to further hardships during transportation, detention, and an unsafe return home or outright denial of entry. With offshoring, there are virtually no safeguards against human rights abuses. This was evidenced in the EU’s deal with Libya. Since 2017, the EU has spent 59 million euros (US\$64 million) supplying and training the Libyan Coast Guard to stop arrivals in Europe. This has resulted in physical and sexual violence, forced labour and extortion.

Empowering authoritarian regimes: The west’s efforts to offshore migrants seeking refugee status by trading them like commodities in exchange for money is, by default, empowering authoritarian or backsliding democratic regimes. The west supplies these regimes with cash inflows that line the pockets of corrupt governments and the private companies that assist in managing migration through brute force.

In March 2024, the EU struck an offshoring deal with Mauritania in north-west Africa. This agreement has seen politicians and activists,

including Human Rights Watch, raise the alarm. Under the terms of the deal, the EU would pay Mauritania 210 million euros (US\$227.5 million) to curb the flow of migrants into Europe through the country. However, Human Rights Watch warns that these funds would bolster the regime of Mauritanian president Mohamed Oul Ghazouani, who heads an autocratic government that still tolerates certain forms of slavery. This deal with Mauritania also threatens to destabilise domestic politics in the country on the grounds of racism. Afro-Mauritanians have recently faced societal violence under perceptions of their illegality. Mauritanians perceive the EU as settling illegal criminals in their country, creating an even more dangerous situation for resettled asylum seekers.

More than 50 non-profit organisations have warned that this pact would be a catastrophe for migrant rights as asylum seekers could face human rights abuses, detention, unfair legal systems and poor shelter quality. This warning comes as the EU tilts its policy away from safe reception to externalised detention, fences, borders and deportations to unsafe third countries under the veneer of humanitarianism.

This new offshoring industry needs to be stopped in its tracks. Refugee claimants are people in distress, not a commodity to be bought and sold around the world through new trade deals between nations.

Manifestos and the boiling 'pot' with long knives out

The opinion piece by Sibuku Malumbano in New Era Newspaper, 2nd September 2024, argued for political parties to offer the public accurate information about their party's policies, a clear vision and political objectives to allow voters to make informed decisions instead of political sloganeering as a tool for campaigning.

Teboho Bojabotsheha, from Vaal University of Technology in South Africa, says that Babbie and Mouton (2004:495) point out that discourse analysis is a complex process that is better suited to those who are interested in theorising about life. In the context of this article, I am interested in theorising about the election manifestos of political parties in Namibia.

There are polarised views about the value of election manifestos, with a number of negative views. Some assert that in most democracies few people actually read them, but what matters is popular perception of a party's identity and what it stands for. Others suggest that party election manifestos are over-rated, finding them sometimes particularly long and complex for the illiterate voter and cynically arguing that party election manifestos seldom persuade voters and should be seen as one of several factors, including gifts of Brötchen and Boerewors Sausage Rolls, which influence people's voting choices.

To McKinley (2009), election manifestos are essentially propaganda tools containing very broad visions of the respective political parties, thinly sketched frameworks for societal development and a host of promises around more specific policy problems and challenges. Petlane (2009:1) believes that party election manifestos, hardly read by anyone, range from "mere sloganeering to monumental tomes packed with dry bureaucratic – academic – political - speak". Petlane's (2009:1) alternative to party election manifestos in their current form are 'demand-driven manifestos' which he says are more inclusive. Whether we agree with the above views or not, to me the election manifestos share certain common specific sequential structures and features, which include a message of the presidential candidate; a statement of achievements, challenges and justification; vision, plans, programmes and implementation measures as well as concluding remarks.

For the purpose of this article, the election manifestos can be seen, following Chouliaraki and Fairclough (1999:21), as "shifting articulations of symbolic/discursive resources (such as genre, discourse, voices) which themselves come to be articulated into relative permanence as moments of discourse, and transformed in that process". Like other manifestos, they present the "strategic direction and outlines of prospective legislation" (Scruton 1982:358), to be expected in the event the organisation received enough votes from the electorate to serve in government.

I will attempt to analyse the manifestos in terms of genre and its sequential structure, pronouns, intertextuality, contrasting expressions, grounding and elisions, and the discourse of

'total freedom', which is actually an integral part of the dominant hegemonic discourse of politics in Africa in general and Namibia in particular, fuelled by globalisation and its economic imperatives.

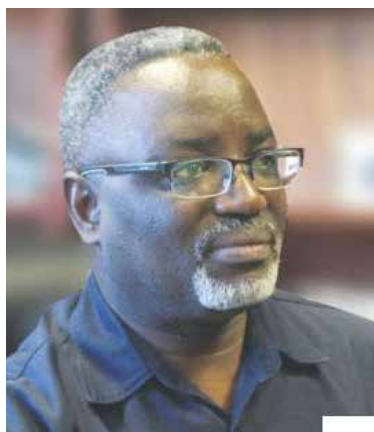
At the heart of the languages used in the manifestos are linguistic devices, techniques and strategies used by the political parties to position themselves as the only parties in the country that are fit to govern. These devices, techniques and strategies include; ambiguous pronouns. The election manifestos are characterised by an ambiguity in their use of pronouns, such as 'we' and 'our' etcetera. Firstly, there is an attempt to build up an affinity between the author of the manifestos and the audience. The same inclusive pronouns are used to build up an affinity between the parties and the audience with respect to the work which still needs to be done.

Lastly, there is also an attempt to build up an affinity between the parties and the audience to position their visions as shared ones.

The use of inclusive pronouns such as 'we' and 'our' has the effect of blurring the distinction between the parties and the audience. The audience becomes one with the parties and, in this process of becoming, the parties share their achievements and failures. The use of these inclusive pronouns is actually consistent with the inclusive or "plain-folk" technique which, according to Zheng (2000:2), functions to assimilate the speaker into the group or groups and then to win the support of members of these groups. In this case the technique functions to include the parties as members or integral part of the people whose votes the parties are targeting. What the inclusive pronouns do as well is to bestow the parties with the authority to speak as parties ruling on behalf of and together with all the potential electorate. The manifestos themselves are bestowed with the authority to speak as documents which belong to all the citizens, regardless of differences based on race, gender, class, etcetera.

The manifestos draw a very sharp contrast between the apartheid system before 1990 and the ensuing democratic system through contrasting expressions. Specific contrasting expressions are used to portray the earlier period as diametrically opposed to the later one, from expressions such as 'oppression', 'exploitation', 'despair' and 'evil' to others such as 'freedom', 'hope' and 'good'. Other terms used to describe the period of the apartheid system include 'neglect', 'indignity', 'relations of hatred/enmity', 'disrespect' and 'depravity'. Terms used to describe the period of the democratic system include 'better quality of life', 'peace and dignity', 'united nation', 'relations of friendship with the international community'.

The stark contrast helps lull the audience into identifying with the democratic system as well as the party, in this case of the ruling party, for having ushered in, single handedly, the revolutionary, progressive and transformative political system and all the achievements associated with it. Any opposition to the ruling party by implication is tantamount to nostalgia for and identification with the pre-1990 period and its characteristic evil system of apartheid, and opposition to the post-1990 period of democracy



and accompanying achievements and successes brought about by the ruling party.

In all of the election manifestos the ruling party is foregrounded as the organisation which not only brought freedom but also led the struggle for change and transformative vision. The ruling party is also foregrounded as the organisation with an appropriate vision of a non-racial and democratic country; an organisation which had accumulated the relevant experience to realise the said vision and has the capacity and resources to speed up "the journey to a better life."

Nothing is said, whatsoever, about the engagement of other political parties. Evident here is their elision – or omission - which can be equated to their backgrounding. There is thus a foregrounding of the ruling party and what it has done and a backgrounding, through elision, of other political parties for political hegemony.

The election manifestos remind the audience that it was that party only, not any other contending political party, which "has introduced laws to protect workers; created machinery to negotiate wages and working conditions; set minimum wages for domestic workers, farm workers, hospitality, taxi workers and security sectors and established maximum hours of work for all. Thus, the party is "best placed to lead the country in the right direction, ensuring growth that is equitable and sustainable, as well as prosperity for all our citizens". We have seen this with McHenry Venaani of PDM saying his party has tabled several motions in Parliament and the party's health portfolio has been putting the government on the spot. They brought the idea that the middleman in the health sector must come to an end when it comes to the procurement of medicine and that today, thanks to PDM, there are dialysis centres in the country. As far as the ruling party SWAPO's election manifesto is concerned, it will probably promise to lower the cost of living, reduce unemployment, poverty and inequality and "intensify economic transformation and make sure that the State actively retains the strategic assets of the economy, maximum natural resources beneficiation, creating a conducive environment for sports and creative industries to thrive and most importantly, dealing with education's new curriculum ambiguity."

This was said by SWAPO Party Youth League Secretary Efraim Nekongo when he appealed to SWAPO's Presidential candidate Netumbo Nandi-Ndaitwah at a SWAPO Oshana Youth Rally held in Ongwediva. In addition, Nekongo pleaded with the SWAPO Presidential candidate to erase students' debts and move away from loans to student grants, deal with

corruption and the backlog of housing provision, and ensure equitable health care and social services, agricultural transformation and food security, as well as protect state-own enterprises against sabotage and subsequent liquidation. However, the question is; is there a capable team that is able to respond to these challenges?

This is possible if the party attracts, from the upcoming Electoral College or 'pot', as it is known in SWAPO lexicon, skilled people with abilities that can help the country in the transformation agenda. I therefore agree with SWAPO seasoned politicians and veterans, Nahas Angula and Helmut Angula who urged the delegates to the SWAPO Electoral College to look for candidates who can represent the party in the National Assembly and represent the broader populace in terms of competence, gender, the country's demographic, economic status, the youth, the poor and marginalised etc.

I therefore implore all those who are going to attend the SWAPO Party Electoral College to desist from the above practices and avoid factionalism of the 'neo-liberal' vs 'the radical transformation' factions or 'the older generation of Baby Boomers and Gen X' vs 'the newest generation of the born-free or the Gen Y or Millennials and the Gen Z' factions.

In an article written by Brandon Hogan, J.D., Ph.D. Assistant Professor of Philosophy, Howard University, Washington, DC, titled; Frantz Fanon's Engagement With Hegel's Master-Slave Dialectic, Hogan posits that Fanon embraces Hegel's abstract conception of freedom as both him and Hegel believe that mutual recognition is necessary if an individual or a group is to have a coherent self-conception.

Hegel's dialectic is usually presented in three stages of development: a thesis that leads to its reaction; an antithesis that contradicts or negates the thesis; and the tension between the two is resolved by a synthesis.

According to Hogan, we would do best to understand Fanon as claiming that Blacks are not masters not because they do not own slaves, but because they do not set their own values, but simply adopt the values of whites. A master, in this sense, possesses one element of Hegelian freedom. The master abides by norms of his own choosing.

Some Blacks, for Fanon, have adopted the master's attitude in that they take themselves to be autonomous. The Black slave, in this context, recognizes the authority of white values, but has no conception of his own authority. Thus, for Fanon, the historical aim of Black struggle has been that of becoming white. Political freedom and learned inferiority, in this case, exist as barriers to Black worth and Black self-recognition.

Let us stop mimicking other people's values and norms. How could people who have their umbilical cords buried in the same kraal or garden and who were comrades in arms yesterday in the struggle fighting a common enemy turn against each other and now some behave as if they are masters of others simply because of their connection to capital? Let us value each other and stop the back-biting, the back-stabbing and the pull-down syndrome. UN cybercrime treaty enables threatening state intrusion

Flawed treaty will provide cover for installing a highly problematic law in Namibia

Alarm has reverberated around the world following the adoption of the draft UN convention on cybercrime in early August 2024 by the Ad Hoc Committee of the UN General Assembly specifically created to draft such a treaty.

What is fueling the alarm within the global human rights community is the fact that the draft convention, which is set to be adopted by the UN General Assembly (UNGA) over coming months, has been adopted without addressing critical flaws in the treaty text that threatens to further erode the already fragile global human rights environment. The fear that is being voiced is that the draft cybercrime convention, which flows from a Russian proposal from over five years ago, will legitimize the already evident human rights abuses of authoritarian states, while also providing cover for other, even democratic, states to insert repressive measures into domestic laws and frameworks.

Significant among the draft convention's myriad of critical flaws are the absence of strong protections or safeguards for the rights to privacy and freedom of expression, in line with the established global human rights order.

An August 2024 analysis of the draft convention by US-based Just Security concludes that "while presented as a global milestone, [the draft convention] dangerously weakens human rights by offering broad criminal offense definitions and expansive surveillance powers, both domestically and across borders, with inadequate or at times non-existent human rights safeguards. These flaws open the door to widespread abuse, allowing governments to misuse the treaty for repressive purposes".

Worth noting is that the issue of rights-threatening "expansive surveillance powers" was raised well before and up to the final round of treaty negotiations, from 29 July to 9 August 2024, by various digital rights actors. In the weeks leading up to the final negotiations, in New York, the Electronic Frontier Foundation (EFF) noted that "without robust privacy and human rights safeguards in the actual treaty text, we will see increased government overreach, unchecked surveillance, and unauthorized access to sensitive data – leaving individuals vulnerable to violations, abuses, and transnational repression".

Abuse enabled

This last point is of concern in the Namibian context. A Namibian government delegation, from the Ministry of Justice, was present in New York in early August for the final round of treaty negotiations and adoption. It appears that the Namibian government is supportive of the final draft of the UN cybercrime treaty. Namibia does not have a cybercrime law on the statute books, but a draft bill has been in the works for the better part of a decade, with



indications as of early-September 2024 being that a substantive draft is close to being finalized.

With the draft UN cybercrime convention mere months away from adoption by the UNGA, it seems highly plausible that Namibian authorities will look to the treaty for guidance in finalizing and enacting a Namibian cybercrime framework. In fact, the National Cybersecurity Strategy 2022 – 2027 prioritizes the finalizing of the draft cybercrime bill "in line with international standards", which in a few months will probably include the UN cybercrime treaty.

That said, the last version of the bill circulated for comment in 2021 was flagged for being substantially flawed and human rights threatening.

With regard to state surveillance specifically, and similar to the provisions of the existing communications surveillance framework – consisting of the Namibia Central Intelligence Service Act of 1997, the Communications Act of 2009 and the recent Criminal Procedure Amendment Act of 2023 – a 2021 Legal Assistance Centre (LAC) assessment found that the bill "lacks remedies in the case of illegal interception, which violates the right to an effective remedy for human rights violations".

Similarly, a 2022 assessment of the bill for the Institute for Public Policy Research (IPPR) found that the bill creates parallel communication surveillance procedures to those in the existing framework, while also expanding surveillance powers provided for in the Communications Act, but still "falls short of best practices".

The assessment also found that the surveillance-related provisions in the draft cybercrime bill reflected the shortcomings of the existing surveillance framework: weak oversight, transparency and accountability mechanisms; warrantless interception; lack of user notification; lack of privacy and data

protections; etc.

The IPPR assessment advises that "the procedural and substantive powers in Namibia's cybercrime law should be subject to clear protections for privacy, freedom of expression, and other human rights".

The draft UN cybercrime treaty will not push the Namibian government to heed this advice, but rather it would accommodate and condone the opposite.

What this effectively means for Namibians is that state mass surveillance practices of questionable legality could effectively be accorded a sheen of lawfulness by the UN convention.

Concerning Region

Namibia is part of a region – the Southern African Development Community (SADC) – in which cybercrime laws have already become highly problematic in the context of human rights.

Namibia and Lesotho are the only two countries in the 16-member bloc that have not yet enacted cybercrime laws.

In the majority of SADC countries where such laws exist, the human rights violations and abuses being perpetrated through the application of such and related laws are increasingly well-documented. Intelwatch researchers concluded that 25 African countries have laws that authorize the interception of communication and the vast majority require mandatory SIM card registrations linking reporters' electronic communications to the country's legal entities. Social media has also, to an extent, been criminalized in the region. Two meetings explicitly made recommendations to that effect: the 2019 Committee of Intelligence and security services of Africa in Abuja and the 2020 SADC Heads of State meeting where members states were urged to mitigate the impact of fake news and abuse of social media (especially during elections) "as social media was being exploited by subversive and negative forces to destabilize" countries.

A 2023 study mapping the repressive use of cybercrime laws in the SADC region found that the "enabling of state surveillance abuse and/or overreach – especially through mass surveillance enabling legislative and regulatory measures – has become a primary concern, particularly for media freedom advocates, in the context of cybersecurity and/or cybercrime law and regulatory crafting and drafting in the SADC region".

SADC authoritarians could see the UN cybercrime convention as legitimizing their repressive practices, which could further exacerbate human rights abuses and democratic decline across southern Africa.

The impact of colonialism on contemporary African knowledge systems

My first reaction to the concept of decolonisation of epistemology was cognitive dissonance. I could not reconcile decolonisation of anything within our contemporary space.

To put it in philosophical terms, the concept seemed to be ontologically misaligned to the world we live in. Suppose we understand ontology as an "inventory" of everything accessible to us (through our senses and our analytical intellect), then ontology should matter only to the extent that it is useful for progress in the modern industrial epoch.

Although the subject of epistemological decolonisation has been gaining momentum, it is still vaguely defined. It seems to fail to first account for the post-colonial nature of society, politics and economy — and what ought to be known (epistemic equipment) to participate in these post-colonial systems.

So, my attempt is to discern the meaning of decolonisation of epistemology within a contemporary ontological context (namely, what should be known today, how and why?)

In my Mail & Guardian article titled "colonialism's shadow looms over policing", I alluded to the expulsion of the native from their lands. At that point it occurred to me that epistemology is, and was not independent of the land and how the native could work and live off it.

And I must add that cosmological epistemology — in a spiritual sense — was not independent of the land either. That is why the rain queen had her work cut out in that pre-colonial cosmology.

So, what did colonialism do to alter pre-colonial epistemology? The point of departure is the three-pronged strategy the British employed to change the lifestyle, the African ways of making a living and what the native had to know to fruitfully participate in the new world order that the British had engineered.

First, the British abolished the pre-colonial communal land ownership and replaced it with individualised lots or sections. Second, the Christianisation of the native replaced what the British viewed as paganism. Third, Western education was introduced hand in hand with British ways of making a living.

The three were interlocked such that the transformation of pre-colonial epistemology would be rendered inescapable. To feed from the land, the native had to know how to work it, according to the new colonial agricultural system. To attain that knowledge the native had to take instruction from the European school and the European master of the land. At church the missionary could not have forgotten the Bible verse that enjoined the servant to obey their master.

The epistemological implications of spatial displacement, Europeanisation of economic activities and individualisation of economic progress reverberated to our contemporary societies. You do not only reap what you sow in today's world of work.

You also eat according to what you know. As our universities advance the decolonisation of epistemology on the one hand, on the other hand the stringent university entry requirements are individualistic and competitive.

The degree, diploma or certificate you obtain after passing your examination

is a product of an epistemology that is shaped by the world of work for which the university is preparing a student. In the workplace, the job interview and your performance agreement are individualised. Rewards for good or excellent performance are individualised. That cannot be blamed on the employers of course.

By the time a candidate walks into the boardroom for the job interview, they have already been through an epistemological system that punishes the students caught sharing answers during the examinations. Under the watchful eye of the invigilator, the postcolonial individualisation of epistemology is enforced with an unforgiving iron fist.

As I ponder the question of decolonisation of epistemology in 21st century Africa, I raise three categories of inquiry. First, the singularity of the human form (ubuntu) and its epistemological implications. Second, the first building block of a pre-colonial African society and its implications for epistemology. Third, the re-configuration of spatial occupation of the land and its implications for epistemology.

On the singularity of the human form, in philosophical terms ubuntu claims that, "You are, therefore I am."

Because we are individual instances of one human form, we are divided in unity. For this reason, your human problems are my human problems and vice versa. And since I see myself in you, you are a familiar stranger.

The atrocious colonialism might have been facilitated by the Africans seeing themselves in the Europeans initially, whereas the Europeans pretended as if the Africans did not manifest from the same human form.

Regarding the building blocks of the society, what must have been the atomic foundation of an African society? Was it the individual, family, community or the entire society of communities?

Historically the building block of an African society was the community, the product of which was communalism. Communalism produced collectivisation of making a living, and to that end communal epistemology must have emerged.

With regards to the land and the sharing of the space in particular, the expulsion of the African from their land scattered more than the human beings.

It also scattered the African epistemological unity (what Africans knew together, how and why). The workplace may mimic the sharing of space and can propagate epistemic singularity for success in projects that require team effort. But it has not removed individualistic survivalism and its attendant epistemic individualism.

But where to from here? In my view the problem is not the 21st century perspective of the world — what to know about it, why and how. It is the transformation of individualism to communalism on the one hand, and the adaptation of epistemology to 21st century African ontology on the other. That could translate to an African education and training system that views curriculum philosophy as ontological primarily, and epistemological secondarily.

Exports worth N\$5.3 billion left by sea in July

Goods worth of N\$5.3 billion, representing 53.3% of total exports left the country by sea in July. The basket of exports via sea comprised mainly of uranium, fish and nickel ores and concentrates.

Goods exported via road accounted for 28.6% of total exports, of which its export basket was mainly made up of petroleum oils, fish and live animals. Lastly, air transportation accounted for 18.1% with non-monetary gold and precious stones (diamonds) being the highest valued commodities transported via the respective mode. In terms of volume, a total of 342 476 tons of goods left the country, representing an increase of 21.6% and a decrease of 47.4% when compared to the months of June 2024 and July 2023, respectively.

In July, 171 413 tons of goods was recorded as exported via road representing an increase of 5.3% month-on-month and 25.6% year-on-year.

A total of 170 935 tons of goods left the country by sea, an increase of 43.8% and a decrease of 66.8% when compared to tons registered in June and the same month of 2023, respectively.

In addition, only 127 tons of goods left the country by air during July, indicating a decrease of one-ton month-on-month and a decrease of 30 tons' year-on-year.

Road transportation was the common



mode of transport used for the goods imported during July. Imports by road were valued at N\$7 billion, representing 58.4% share of all goods imported into the country. Motor vehicles for the transportation of goods, nickel ores and concentrates and motor cars for the transportation of persons were the commodities with the highest value imported via this respective mode of transport. Sea transport followed in second place accounting for 37.4% of all goods imported into the country and its basket comprised mainly of petroleum oils, wheat and iron and steel bars.

Furthermore, 4.1% of total goods imported reached Namibia via air, precious stones (diamonds), telecommunications equipment' and medicaments were the main commodities transported via air.

With respect to volume, on the demand side, goods imported into the country amounted to 497 790 tons during the month under review, increasing by 37.1% and 23.1% when compared to the previous month and the same month of 2023, respectively. During the month under review, 291 094 tons of goods arrived in Namibia by sea, this translates into an increase of 66.1% and 9.5% when compared to the tons recorded in June and July 2023, respectively. Additionally, 206 417 tons of goods entered the country by road, translating into an increase of 18 759 tons and 68 147 tons from the tons recorded the previous month and in July 2023, respectively. Finally, 180 tons of goods arrived in the country by air during the month of July 2024, yielding a decrease of four tons and 12 tons when compared to June and July 2023, respectively.



Beef, charcoal exports under threat

The European Union (EU)'s Deforestation Regulation to be effective as of 1 January 2025, is a big threat to Namibia's beef and charcoal exports, the Namibian Agriculture Union has warned.

The expansion of agricultural land is seen as the main driver behind deforestation, desertification and a loss of biodiversity. It is linked to the production of commodities such as cattle, wood, cocoa, soya, palm oil, coffee, rubber, and some of their derivative products, such as leather, chocolate, tires or furniture. The NAU said the EU is a major economy and consumer of commodities linked to these negative practices and they feel partly responsible for the problem. The EU statistics state that 8% of Namibia is covered by forests and that the country has experienced a 17% decline in these areas over the past 20 years. In addition, Namibia exported N\$51 million worth of charcoal and N\$40 million worth of beef to the EU in 2023.

"This puts Namibia on the EU's radar. Namibia is currently classified as a standard risk by the EU, and Namibia will seek to be recognised as a low-risk country in the future," the NAU said.

The impact on the Namibian beef industry is that operators exporting beef to the EU must carry out due diligence before they can apply for the exports, the union said.

"This investigation entails that operators must provide certain evidence that the product comes from places that apply correct environmental practices from the place of origin of the animals to where they are slaughtered," the union said.

The Livestock and Livestock Products Board (LLPB) of Namibia is closely examining all the criteria and what information a producer will have to provide to the relevant operators to enable the latter to comply with the EU requirements.

The NAU added that a national system is being looked at to be able to collect the information in the most effective way.

There are still several issues that need

to be ironed out among the relevant line ministries, but they are receiving attention. The Charcoal Association of Namibia (CAoN) has already done considerable work because the charcoal industry is also strongly affected by this regulation.

The NAU said the immediate next steps involve the LLPB drafting a comprehensive questionnaire that encompasses all necessary criteria in accordance with EU regulations.

International reserves rise to N\$60.8 billion

The stock of international reserves rose by 5.5% to N\$60.8 billion at the end of July, the Bank of Namibia announced.

The increase in international reserves was on the back of higher SACU receipts, as well as Customer Foreign Currency (CFC) placements. This level of foreign reserves translated into 4.1 months of import cover, exceeding the international benchmark of 3 months. Notably, the import cover, excluding imports of oil exploration and appraisal activities, stood at 4.9 months at the end of July, relative to 4.6 months recorded at the end of June.

Furthermore, the banking industry liquidity position decreased in July. The overall liquidity position of the banking industry decreased to N\$6.4 billion in July, from N\$8 billion recorded in June. The decrease was mainly ascribed to lower inflows, fueled by lower diamond sales during the period under review, the central bank said.

In addition, the central bank further

disclosed that the annual growth in the stock of broad money supply (M2) decreased at the end of July to 8.1%, lower than 9.2% growth recorded at the end of June.

“The decline emanated from a decrease in the growth of Net Foreign Assets of the Depository Corporations, specifically that of the Other Depository Corporations. This was mainly evident in the decrease in claims on non-residents, reflected in both short and longer dated deposits. Contrary, growth in domestic claims



increased slightly at the end of the review period, recording a growth rate of 2.3%, relative to 2% registered at the end of the preceding month, mainly due to an observed increase in claims on other sectors.” Additionally, the central bank pointed out that annual growth in credit extended to the private sector (PSCE) remained unchanged and stood at

1.8% at the end of July, similar to the rate recorded at the end of June. “Despite a modest uptick in the growth for business credit during the review period, this was offset by a decrease in the growth for credit to the household sector, resulting in stagnant growth for overall PSCE.” Lastly, it was disclosed that the annual growth in business credit increased

slightly at the end of July. The growth in credit extended to businesses increased moderately to 0.8% at the end of July, slightly higher than the 0.5% recorded at the end of June. “Business credit continues to be sustained by the growth in instalment sales and leasing, particularly from the car rental industry, benefiting from improved tourism activity.”

Another repo rate cut projected

Namibia experienced a dynamic month in August in the fixed income market, characterised by fluctuating demand levels and interest rate reductions that have influenced yields, latest financial statistics have shown.

The Bank of Namibia conducted five treasury bill auctions, two primary bond auctions, and completed the final GC24 switch.

Secondary trades on the Namibian Stock Exchange (NSX) saw an overall decline, although there was a notable increase in trading volumes for the GC27 bond.

Interest rates, which had been raised from 3.75% during the pandemic to a peak of 7.75% by July 2023, were reduced on August 14th when the Bank of Namibia’s Monetary Policy Committee decided to lower the repo rate by 25 basis points. This adjustment brought the repo rate down to 7.50% and the prime lending rate from 11.50% to 11.25%.

Simonis Storm Securities said in its analysis that the repo rate adjustment resulted in yields on Treasury Bills (TBs) dropping by an average of 20 basis points in the subsequent auction, reflecting strong market participation with high volumes tendered. Although bond yields also decreased, the market response was more subdued compared to the immediate impact seen on short-term debt instruments, the report added.

With borrowing costs remaining relatively high, this recent rate cut is expected to provide some relief to households, particularly as private sector credit extension has been sluggish, the report said.

Looking ahead, Simonis said there is potential for another rate cut in Namibia before the end of the year. The recent adjustment has widened the interest rate differential between Namibia and South Africa to 75 basis points, yet it is anticipated that South Africa may also implement a rate reduction in response to similar economic pressures.

Simonis believe that the current restrictive monetary policy in South Africa is hindering economic development, as reflected in the modest GDP growth rate of just 0.6% for 2023. The unemployment rate has also risen, reaching 33.5% in the second quarter of 2024, up from 32.9% in the first quarter. High borrowing costs continue to be a significant barrier to economic expansion, with the repo rate currently set at 8.25%. In addition, private sector credit extension exhibited sluggish growth of 3.5% in July, down from 4.3% in June, it noted.

Looking ahead, forecasts for 2024 suggest that the economy could achieve a growth rate of 1%, assuming supportive monetary policy adjustments and continued improvements in the energy sector. In the second quarter of the year, South Africa recorded a GDP growth of 0.4%, indicating that the forecasted growth rate remains within reach.

Andrada transforms into multi-mineral producer

Andrada Mining has transformed itself into a multi-mineral producer during the 2024 financial year, achieving a remarkable double-digit increase in tin concentrate production and successfully produced its first commercial batch of tantalum, solidifying our position as a key player in the critical metals space, chairman, Glen Parsons said. During the same period, Andrada has implemented a water recycling programme that reduced its environmental impact. “We also maintained a 99% Namibian workforce, demonstrating our commitment to the local community. Andrada’s vision is deeply intertwined with our identity as a proudly Namibian company with significant future growth and value potential,” said Parsons. The company managed to unlock additional value through exploration milestones at Lithium Ridge and Spodumene Hill. This development approach has enabled the production of tantalum and lithium concentrates, establishing additional revenue streams that will significantly mitigate single product price and demand volatility risks. “Multi-mineral production at Uis Mine



will also drive down overall costs to the benefit of the bottom line. The ability to increase revenue and cash flow while managing costs remains imperative to improving profitability.” The period saw increased tin

production and commencement of tantalum production, which saw 50% annual volume increases in both tin concentrate and tin metal production. “This was mainly due to the plant expansion implemented towards

the end of the prior financial year. The expanded plant is now in stable production. Furthermore, we successfully produced our first consignment of tantalum at the end of the 2024 financial year. This proved

our ability to meet the AfriMet supply agreement and marked a key milestone in Andrada’s goal of being a multi-mineral producer.” During the year, the company forged new global and local funding partnerships with the Development Bank of Namibia, Bank Windhoek, and Orion Resource Partners while nurturing existing relationships. Parsons said the company is confident that the ring-fenced US\$12.5 million Orion tin royalty, combined with the continuous improvement programme launched during the year at Uis Mine, will enable the company to realise this objective. Andrada spent just over N\$505 million (US\$27 million) through procurement from Namibian suppliers in the 2024 financial year. Chief executive Officer, Anthony Villjoen added that bringing a lithium concentrate to market will be the first step to validating the lithium potential of the Erongo Region and unlocking the significant potential of the company’s large mineral resource. He said annual ore processing now stands at approximately one million tonnes, and tin concentrate production at approximately 1 500 tonnes. “This takes us a step closer to our goal of producing 2 600 tonnes of tin concentrate (1 600 tonnes of contained tin), in line with the Orion royalty agreement.”

Capricorn group spends N\$25.8 million on social impact

Capricorn Group has announced a total spending of N\$25.8 million, including contributions from its foundation, towards corporate social responsibility (CSR) initiatives in Namibia and Botswana. Inflation to stabilise at 4.9%

Simonis Storm Security projections suggest that inflation will stabilise at around 4.9% by the end of the year.

The Bank of Namibia's monetary policy committee decided to implement a 25 basis point rate cut at its last meeting, reducing the repo rate to 7.50% and the prime rate to 11.25%. Simonis said although these rates remain relatively elevated, the reduction offers some relief to Namibian households and businesses by lowering borrowing costs. "Despite this rate cut, we anticipate that private sector credit extension growth will remain modest in the near term. This is due to the lag effect of interest rate changes, where it typically takes some time for the impact of rate adjustments to fully materialise in the broader economy," Simonis said. Looking ahead, Simonis projections suggest that inflation will stabilize at around 4.9% year on year by the

end of 2024. "Additionally, we foresee another 25 basis point rate cut at the December monetary policy meeting, which would bring the year-end interest rate to 7.25%. We expect the central bank to carefully observe the outcomes of this monetary easing before considering any further policy changes," the firm said. The South African Reserve Bank (SARB) on the other hand has said it decided to keep the repo rate unchanged at 8.25%. Four members of its monetary committee preferred an unchanged stance, and two preferred a reduction of 25 basis points. The SARB said its monetary committee agreed that restrictive policy remains appropriate to stabilise inflation at 4.5%. The committee assessed that an unchanged stance remained appropriate, given the inflation risks. Some members, however, were of the view that the inflation outlook had improved enough to reduce the degree of restrictiveness.

The SARB noted that the global interest rates remain high, especially in the United States, and rates may stay higher for even longer than markets currently anticipate. This presents risks to the currency outlook, it said. "Domestically (South Africa), inflation expectations do not yet reflect the 4.5% midpoint objective over the medium term. While expectations are moving in the right direction, they continue to show the impact of the recent inflation surge. We remain concerned about administered prices. We have had to markup electricity inflation for this forecast round, even as other categories shifted lower." The SARB said services price inflation also remains uncomfortably above the mid-point and the forecast continues to see rates easing into more neutral territory by next year. "We are committed to stabilising inflation at the mid-point of the target band. Achieving this outcome will improve the economic outlook and reduce borrowing costs," the SARB said.

Shareholding changes at Deep Yellow

The Vanguard Group of Australia has become a substantial shareholder in Deep Yellow the company that is developing the Tumas project in the Erongo Region after it acquired 48 million shares with a voting right of 5.003%.

The development was confirmed by Deep Yellow Managing Director and CEO, John Borshoff. Vanguard Group is the manager of various Mutual funds and accounts and in that capacity has the power to dispose of the shares. Deep Yellow is progressing its dual-pillar strategy to establish a multi-mine company with capacity to produce 10 million pounds of uranium per annum. The company has acquired and developed a portfolio of geographically diverse exploration, early-stage and advanced uranium projects. Deep Yellow has two advanced projects, Tumas and Mulga Rock (Western Australia). Both projects are located in Tier-1 uranium jurisdictions and have a potential production capacity of more than seven million pounds per annum, Tumas 3.6 million pounds per annum and a potential 30+ year Life of Mine (LoM) and Mulga Rock, 3.5 million per pound and 15 plus year LoM. In late 2023, the company completed a review of the 2023 Tumas Definitive Feasibility Study (DFS), which generated excellent results and strengthened the Project's status as a long-life, world-class uranium operation. Shortly after this, Deep Yellow received the mining licence for Tumas and remains on track for a final investment decision to be made in the fourth quarter of this year, with operations scheduled to commence in 2026. The company is also well-positioned for continued organic growth through

development of its highly prospective exploration portfolio which comprises Omahola (Namibia) and Alligator River (Northern Territory) and inorganic growth through further consolidation of targeted high-quality uranium assets. Deep Yellow believes that the shift in global thinking and sentiment towards the adoption of nuclear energy continues to generate strong momentum for the uranium sector. The company believes that most major economies are in full alignment demanding more nuclear, as it is the only 24/7 clean energy source that can provide baseload power supply and numerous other vital applications, while achieving zero emissions. Deep Yellow explained that the need for more nuclear was highlighted at COP28, where over 20 countries signed to the goal of tripling nuclear energy capacity to achieve zero emissions by 2050. The company believes that this has created an exciting opportunity for the uranium market, expected to result in exceptional growth and value generating opportunities for Deep Yellow, as the company is well-placed to provide production optionality, security of supply and geographic diversity to a growing market.

Osino finally in Chinese hands

Osino Resources Corp has announced that it has been finally acquired by Shanjin International Gold of China for cash consideration of 1.90 Canadian dollars (N\$25) for each share.

The deal was first announced in February and will see, Shanjin pay 368 million Canadian dollars (N\$4.8 billion) to take over Osino. Shanjin intends to cause Osino to delist the Osino Shares from the TSX Venture Exchange, to submit an application for it to cease to be a reporting issuer, and to otherwise terminate its public company reporting requirements as soon as possible. Osino is focused on the fast-tracked development of our wholly owned, Twin Hills Gold Project in central Namibia. Osino has a commanding ground position within Namibia's prospective Damara sedimentary mineral belt, mostly in proximity to and along strike of the producing Navachab and Otjikoto Gold Mines. Shanjin International's 2023 annual report showed that operating income

of 8.106 billion yuan, with a net profit attributable to shareholders of 1.424 billion yuan, marking a year-on-year increase of 26.79% and reaching a historic high. Shanjin said Twin Hills gold mine project is expected to increase gold production capacity by five tons per year upon commencement of production. "This move marks a crucial step in strategic execution. With the implementation of the new strategy and the commencement of global acquisitions, Shanjin International will continue to deepen internal reforms, enhance operational efficiency, intensify exploration efforts, and expand international markets to create more value for shareholders," the company said. At closing of the arrangement, Osino's portfolio will consist only of gold related assets located in Namibia, primarily the Twin Hills Gold Project in central Namibia as well as exploration projects Ondundu and Eureka. Prior to entering into the Shanjin agreement, Osino terminated its arrangement agreement with Dundee Precious Metals dated 17



December, 2023. Heye Daun, President and CEO of Osino, said at that time that whilst the company was appreciative of the previous offer from DPM, the all-cash offer from Shanjin represented a significant premium to the DPM offer price, thus was clearly a superior proposal, and is an excellent outcome

for Osino's shareholders. Shanjin is experienced, well-financed, and has a highly credible track record of gold mining in China, with the technical skills and financial resources to progress the project through construction and into production, Daun added. Xingong Ou, President of Shanjin has

stated that the Twin Hills represents a unique opportunity to add a high-quality gold development asset to its portfolio in a stable and mining friendly jurisdiction. The project provides the foundation for our future production profile with production targeted for 2026, as well as significant exploration upside, Xingong said.

Oil's meltdown worsens on concern over demand and OPEC+ supply

Oil sank even further after crashing to the lowest level this year on concern that fragile demand and restored supplies from OPEC+ will create a new glut.

Brent futures fell to around \$73 a barrel following a meltdown of almost 5% on Tuesday, while West Texas Intermediate dropped under \$70 for the first time since early January. Downbeat economic data from China and the US stirred fears over demand in the top two consumers, while a Libyan official predicted a resolution to the crisis that has shuttered half the country's output. Despite the gloom, other OPEC+ nations appear set to proceed with reviving supplies in October.

“Demand concerns and the negative reaction of oil prices to potential supply additions from OPEC+ and Libya indicates a weak market sentiment, suggesting market players don't want to see additional barrels from OPEC+ at present,” said Giovanni Staunovo, an analyst at UBS AG in Zurich.

Oil forecasters from JPMorgan Chase & Co to Standard Chartered Plc had predicted a rally to \$90 a barrel or beyond this quarter, as summer driving demand and OPEC+ supply restraint drained storage tanks around the world. Instead, the commodity has wiped out all of this year's gains. Tuesday's slump began after data from China showed critical engines of economic growth sputtering, with factory activity contracting for a fourth

month and the value of new-home sales declining. US manufacturing activity showed a fifth consecutive month of contraction.

The plunge intensified after Libya's ousted central bank governor, Sadiq Al-Kabir, predicted an end to the crisis that has slashed the North African nation's output in half.

More than 500 000 barrels a day were halted last week when authorities in the east of the country protested Al-Kabir's removal by the Tripoli-based government. Tuesday's sell-off was likely exacerbated by increasingly bearish trend-following algorithmic traders.

Meanwhile, speculators are growing increasingly anxious that Libya's partners in the Organisation of Petroleum Exporting Countries seem set on proceeding with an agreement to restore halted production.

Led by Saudi Arabia and Russia, the OPEC+ alliance plans to add 180 000 barrels a day in October as it gradually restarts output halted since 2022 in a bid to shore up prices. The cartel had said it could “pause or reverse” the hike if necessary, but officials have privately indicated the increase remains on track.

Investors are also watching monthly jobs data due Friday that could offer more insight on the Federal Reserve's path forward on interest-rate cuts. A report last month showed a rise in the unemployment rate to a level that triggered a popular recession indicator.

“The financial markets seem to be in peak panic mode with a fortnight left for the Fed's crucial ‘pivot’ policy meeting,” said Vandana Hari, founder of Vanda Insights.-MONEYWEB

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Trump ordered to stop using Isaac Hayes' music

A US judge has ordered Donald Trump's campaign to stop using the song *Hold On, I'm Coming* at his rallies, in response to a lawsuit from the family of the song's co-writer, Isaac Hayes.

The Republican presidential nominee regularly plays the song before and after his speeches, including at the Republican National Convention in July.

However, Hayes' family have sued Mr Trump's campaign, saying that it repeatedly ignored requests to stop using the song, made famous by soul duo Sam and Dave in 1966.

The temporary ruling, by Judge Thomas Thrash in Georgia, means the campaign is banned from playing it again until the court case is settled.

However, the judge did not grant a request to order Mr Trump's campaign to take down recordings of past events in which it had used the song.

Hayes' son, Isaac Hayes III, welcomed the ruling, saying that his father, who died in 2008, would not have endorsed the former President.

"We have to take a stand that we want to separate ourselves from someone with Donald Trump's character," he said outside the Richard B Russell Federal courthouse in Atlanta, Georgia.

"This is not a political issue, this is a character issue."

Ronald Coleman, a lawyer for Mr Trump, said that the campaign had already agreed to "cease further use" of *Hold On, I'm Coming* (Mr Trump has returned to using the Village People's YMCA since the lawsuit was filed last month).

"We're very gratified that the court recognised the First Amendment issues at stake and didn't order a takedown of existing videos," Mr Coleman added.

He also suggested the case could be settled before coming to trial.

"Before we left court, we spoke to the Hayes' attorneys and to Mr Hayes III, about trying to work something out.

We want this to be as a cooperative process as possible going forward," he

told reporters.

Hayes composed the song in 1966 with Dave Porter, when he was a staff writer at Stax Records. He went on to become a Grammy and Oscar-winner in his own right, with hits like *Shaft* and *Walk On By*.

The star's estate claims that the Mr Trump's campaign used the song on 134 separate occasions after they first asked him to desist.

They are demanding \$3m (£2.4m) in licensing fees for the repeated use of

the song between 2022 and 2024. Mr Trump's lawyers argued that the Hayes estate was not the license holder for the song, and that it had permission to use it, a statement Hayes family lawyers said was "erroneous".

Dozens of other artists have objected to the use of their songs at Republican rallies, as the US Presidential election draws closer.

Abba, Foo Fighters, the White Stripes singer Jack White, Celine

Dion and Johnny Marr have all raised objections in the last month alone. However, musicians have only had limited success in stopping politicians from using their music, and legal proceedings often drag on for years. A case from Guyanese-British singer Eddy Grant over Mr Trump's use of his song *Electric Avenue* is due to be heard in a Manhattan court this Friday, four years after the star's initial complaint.

The star sued Mr Trump over a

2020 campaign video that was soundtracked by a 40-second clip of his song.

The video was viewed 13.7 million times before Twitter took it down, and Grant says this was an unauthorised use for which Mr Trump owes him \$300,000 (£229,000) in damages. As with the Hayes' case, lawyers for Mr Trump argue that the singer does not hold the copyright for his own song.

Weinstein indecent assault charges discontinued by CPS

Indecent assault charges in the UK against disgraced former Hollywood producer Harvey Weinstein have been discontinued by the Crown Prosecution Service (CPS).

The CPS said it had made the decision after reviewing the evidence in the case and concluding "there is no longer a realistic prospect of conviction".

Weinstein, 72, was charged in 2022 with two counts of indecent assault against a woman in London for alleged offences in 1996.

The alleged victim is a woman who is now in her 50s, the Metropolitan Police said at the time.

Frank Ferguson, head of the special crime and counter-terrorism division

at the CPS, said it had a duty to continuously review criminal cases and had "explained our decision to all parties".

"We would always encourage any potential victims of sexual assault to come forward and report to police and we will prosecute wherever our legal test is met."

Weinstein was jailed for 23 years in New York in 2020 for the rape and sexual assault of a former assistant and an actress.

The city's appeals court threw out the conviction in April, ruling that Weinstein did not get a fair trial. He is still being held in New York City's Rikers Island jail while he awaits a retrial later this year.

Weinstein was also sentenced to 16 years in prison in a separate rape trial in California, which he is appealing against.

More than 100 people have made rape and misconduct allegations about Weinstein dating back to the late 1970s.

The decision by his accusers to come forward, and his subsequent conviction in New York, galvanised the #MeToo movement against sexual abuse by powerful men.

Weinstein has always maintained his innocence and argued he was the victim of a "set-up".

He co-founded the Miramax film studio, which produced hits including Shakespeare in Love - which won best

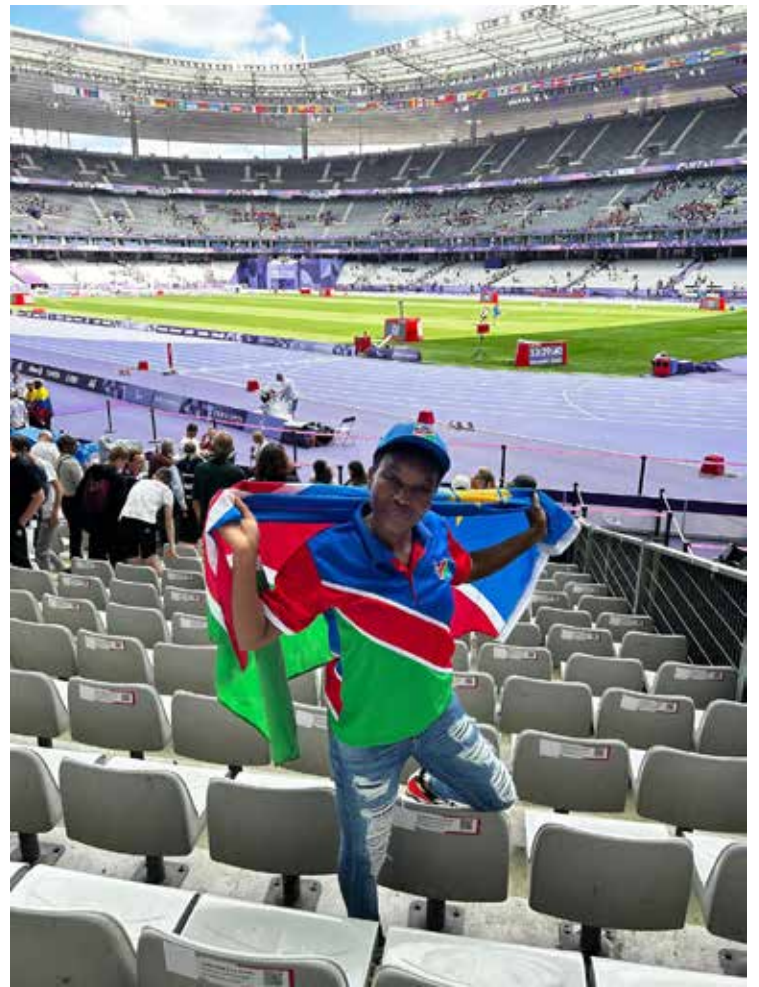

Shipena Secondary School, Ms. Olivier, recognised my potential and encouraged me and my school friends, including Moses Maasdrorp, Esther Haixwema-Mbathera, Rauna Paulus, and Emily Michael, to participate in external club races such as the 'Wanderers Club'. We consistently placed in the top 3/5, primarily in the top 3. It was really cool and exciting, as I was always looking forward to receiving my 'prize' at the assembly

after the weekend races," she said. Her sporting prowess didn't stop in school. Today, Wilika remains an active veteran sprinter, training rigorously under the guidance of her coach, Antoinette Inniss-Haycox. Competing in the 100m and 200m, Wilika proudly showcases times that rank her among the best in her age group in the UK. athletes, particularly when they compete on foreign soil. From the Olympics, Paralympics, and Commonwealth Games to rugby and Formula 1 events, Wilika travels extensively, making her presence felt wherever Namibian colours fly. So, what drives this globetrotting superfan?

“It’s passion, Namibian pride and compatriotism, appreciation, more than anything, to support and be an active Namibian sport ambassador for our motherland. Our athletes should feel a sense of love for our land of the brave. Just imagine as an athlete hearing someone shouting your name, seeing your national flag, and to top it, having fans dancing and cheering for you. That’s priceless sports psychology. Who needs a sports psychologist when you can have fans like ‘Wicks’? Sports psychologist chill I am not trying to make you redundant. We are just part of the

ingredients,” she said. Wilika’s journey as a superfan has been filled with unforgettable experiences. One such moment came during the 2012 London Olympics, where she met members of the Namibian marathon and Paralympic teams. “It was such an exciting moment. Rugby World Cup 2015 meeting the teams during the Argentina vs Namibia game. It was an epic game in 2016/2017. I went to watch F1 at Silverstone and as a proud Namibian, I broke the unwritten ‘code of conduct’ and flew my Namibian flag so high and proudly while greeting Lewis Hamilton during their parade, and after the race, I kept interrupting his team boss, Toto Wolff, asking, ‘When are you bringing F1 to Namibia/Africa? I was so insistent, and not long did Lewis Hamilton recognise there were ‘flags/fans from countries I don’t even know’ and he

must have looked it up Namibian Flag,’ she said. Her persistence in asking when Formula 1 would come to Namibia paid off when Hamilton acknowledged the Namibian flag and later visited the country. Wilika’s belief in the power of fan support is strong. She understands that athletes face immense pressures and challenges behind the scenes, challenges that fans often don’t see. “They are the ones who work hard behind the scenes. We don’t see the struggle they go through. We only see the finished product, and at that point, the finished product can be just as vulnerable, and that’s when they need our support the most. Of course, we also recognise the entire team and the sports community at large, but my love and passion go out to all athletes and all their abilities, and this is inclusive of the grassroots

athletes who so ‘desperately’ want to exercise their maximum talents/gifts and pursue their sports goals under difficult circumstances,” she said. She also encourages Namibians everywhere to stand up for their athletes. “We are a small nation, and Namibia is not known that well. People frequently ask me where our country’s flag originates from. That’s to show that we are not known for. To make ourselves visible and known, we should take pride in our national colours and fly them high with pride,” she urges. Wilika is confident that her unwavering support has made a tangible difference. “I’m sure my presence and encouragement have had a positive impact. Just look at the qualifying times and the wins,” she says with a playful grin. Wilika continues her journey,

supporting Namibian athletes across the globe, her message to the athletes and the Namibian community remains clear. “Athletes have a whole team (ingredients) to help them get to the start line, but we, the fans, are part of that recipe, so our ingredients should be the supporters. Olympian Rebecca Cheptegei dies after being set alight by ex-boyfriend

Olympic athlete Rebecca Cheptegei has died days after being doused in petrol and set on fire by a former boyfriend.

The 33-year-old Ugandan marathon runner, who competed in the recent Paris Olympics, had suffered extensive burns after Sunday's attack.

The authorities in north-west Kenya, where Cheptegei lived and trained, said she was targeted after returning home from church with her two daughters.

Her father, Joseph Cheptegei, said that he had lost a "very supportive" daughter. Fellow Ugandan athlete James Kirwa told the BBC about her generosity and how she had helped out other runners financially.

A report filed by a local administrator alleged the athlete and her ex-partner had been wrangling over a piece of land. Police say an investigation is under way.

Cheptegei, from a region just across the border in Uganda, is said to have bought a plot in Trans Nzoia county and built a house to be near Kenya's elite athletics training centres.

Attacks on women have become a major concern in Kenya. In 2022 at least 34% of women said they had experienced physical violence, according to a national survey.

"This tragedy is a stark reminder of the urgent need to combat gender-based violence, which has

increasingly affected even elite sports," Kenya's Sports Minister Kipchumba Murkomen said.

Speaking to journalists outside the hospital where she had been treated, Mr Cheptegei asked the Kenyan government to ensure justice was done after the death of his daughter.

"We have lost our breadwinner," he added and wondered how her two young children would "proceed with their education".

Dr Kimani Mbugua, a consultant at Moi Teaching and Referral Hospital in Eldoret, told local media that the staff did all they could for her but the athlete "had a severe percentage of burns, which unfortunately led to multi-organ failure, which ultimately led to her passing this morning at 05:30 [02:30 GMT]".

Kirwa, who often trained with Cheptegei and had visited her in hospital, told the BBC she "was a very affable person. [She] helped us all even financially and she brought me training shoes when she came back from the Olympics. She was like an older sister to me". Uganda's athletics federation said in a post on X: "We are deeply saddened to announce the passing of our athlete, Rebecca Cheptegei early this morning who tragically fell victim to domestic violence. As a federation, we condemn such acts and call for justice. May her soul rest In Peace."

"This is heart-breaking. Even more

heart-breaking that it's not the first time the athletics community has lost such an incredible female athlete to domestic violence," British Olympian runner Eilish McColgan wrote on X.

Cheptegei's former boyfriend was also admitted to the hospital in Eldoret - but with less severe burns. He is still in intensive care but his condition was "improving and stable", Moi hospital's Dr Owen Menach said.

Earlier, local police chief Jeremiah ole Kosiom was quoted by local media as saying: "The couple were heard quarrelling outside their house. During the altercation, the boyfriend was seen pouring a liquid on the woman before burning her."

"This was a cowardly and senseless act that has led to the loss of a great athlete. Her legacy will continue to endure," the head of Uganda's Olympic committee Donald Rukare said on X.

Talking to reporters earlier in the week, her father said that he prayed "for justice for my daughter", adding that he had never seen such an inhumane act in his life. Uganda's Sports Minister Peter Ogwang said arrangements were being made to transport Cheptegei's body back to Uganda for burial.

Cheptegei finished 44th in the marathon at the recent Paris Olympics. She also won gold at the World

Mountain and Trail Running Championships in Chiang Mai, Thailand, in 2022.

Her death comes after the killings of fellow East African athletes Agnes Tirop in 2021 and Damaris Mutua the following year, with their partners identified as the main suspects in both cases by the authorities.

Tirop's husband is currently facing murder charges, which he denies, while a hunt for Mutua's boyfriend continues.

"Today has been a sad moment for me. It has been a sad moment for athletes because it really reminded us [of] the day that Agnes was murdered," Kenyan athlete Joan Chelimo told the BBC.

She is involved in Tirop's Angels, an organisation she said was set up as a "wake-up call" after Tirop's murder to address gender-based violence. "We say we need to unite together as athletes and just try to raise awareness, create a place where women can just come and speak up. But it is still on the rise."

Cheptegei's friend Milcah Chemos-Cheywa, a Kenyan athlete who with her in Paris, echoed these feelings. "I can say we are still in shock, and we are in pain, especially as athletes, and this thing happening in Kenya," she told the Reuters news agency. "We remember the case of Agnes Tirop, now it has come to Rebecca, so we are not happy."-BBC

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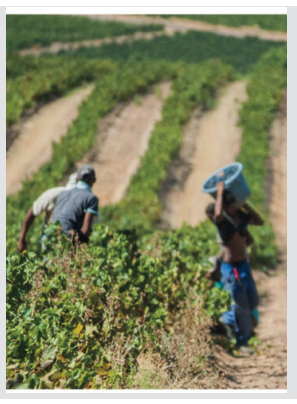

Doreen Sioka calls it quits

Veteran politician and minister of gender equality, poverty eradication, and social welfare, Doreen Sioka, has announced her decision not to return to parliament in 2025, bringing an end to her long and illustrious political career.

She shared this with the Windhoek

Observer on Sunday at the Swapo electoral college in Windhoek. "Enough is enough. One should call it quits. From the age of 15, I've been a politician. Now I'm 64 years old. I want to give the young ones a chance to take over," she said.

Sioka explained the importance of nurturing new leadership and pointed to young leaders such as Tobias Aupindi

Kauandenge defends NUDO leadership choices amid factional dispute

The National Unity Democratic Organisation's (NUDO) Joseph Kauandenge said the party leadership will not hand over power through force but through a peaceful process to a legitimately elected person at a legitimate congress, as per the party constitution.

Kauandenge made these remarks on Sunday in response to a congress that another party faction had organised on Saturday.

He announced that the party's current leadership, led by its president, Ester Muinjangu, converged at a meeting on Sunday morning to discuss, amongst other issues, the congress held in the name of Nudo by a small splinter group claiming legitimacy.

"Usually, our congress consists of 688 delegates, from across the country. What we have seen from pictures emanating from the so-called congress is that not more than 150 people attended that meeting. Some faces we don't even know, and we can dispute as per our congress master list that they are not the real vetted delegates that should have attended the congress," said Kauandenge.

According to the resolution of Nudo's highest decision-making body, the national council, which adopted it on August 31, 2024, at its 6th meeting in Windhoek, the congress will only take place in May 2025 next year.

The same body empowered by the

Constitution also reaffirmed that the current Nudo leadership under Muinjangu will lead the party until the congress is held.

"What is clear is that 80% of our real and authentic delegates to any congress emanating from branches have boycotted this so-called congress as they recognise the current

leadership of the party, and they will only attend a congress that is called through the appropriate structures by the current leadership," said Kauandenge.

He clarified that the party's constitution establishes processes and systems that dictate how and by whom a congress should convene.

According to Kauandenge, NUDO's constitution lacks a structure known as an interim committee, which possesses the authority to convene a congress.

"Nudo has functioning leadership under president Ester Muinjangu that can only be removed by another legitimate congress and nothing else. Be rest assured that we will do everything in our power, legally and otherwise, that this party leadership will not be taken through force of any kind but that we will hand power over freely to a properly constituted congress that is called in line with the provisions of our constitution," urged Kauandenge.

The splinter group's spokesperson, Rirua Komeheke, announced on social media that they had elected new NUDO leadership, with Barry Rukoro serving as its president.

According to him, the congress was

never cancelled because the national executive committee was inferior compared to the national council that had convened the congress.

"We finalised the beginning of the congress. Somebody started it and did not finish it and we finished it. The interim committee did not call the congress. It continued with the congress that was called," he said. The initial congress was called in July. Komeheke reported that 385 delegates and sufficient proxies attended the congress.

"We had enough money to cover the congress, which was self-funded, not the N\$950 000, which was wasted on a congress that did not take place. Branches made their own contribution," he said.

He declined to confirm who the new leaders are, which he said will be announced at a media conference on Monday.

and Emma Theofelus, whom she claims have already been groomed to take on future responsibilities.

"These are the people who need to come in freely. We should give them a chance so that they can use their brains and the knowledge that they have learnt from us. I'm happy, and I'm proud to go back home and support them as they did for me," she said.

As Sioka prepares to retire, she reflected on her accomplishments over the course of her 50-year career in Namibian politics.

When asked what she considers her greatest achievement, Sioka proudly pointed to her contributions to gender equality in Namibia.

"Today we have a female vice president who is also the party presidential candidate for the country. In 2012, I made sure that we amended the Swapo constitution to ensure gender balance. I'm proud that we are now experiencing gender balance. No gaps anymore. Even though I'll be watching from home, I know one day people will remember that Doreen helped ensure

that gender balance is attained. I'm proud of that," she said. As she prepares to embrace a more peaceful life at home, Sioka looks forward to spending time on her small farm with her grandchildren and cattle, far removed from the pressures of the political arena.

"I'm already in power at home," she joked.

"There's no fear that I'll suffer."

In her farewell message to the nation, Sioka offered encouragement to young people, reminding them that leadership is a journey and not an overnight achievement.

"The president likes to say, President Nangolo, everything has got its own time. We should not even cry that I should be in this position. We also took time to have these positions," she said. She drew inspiration from her personal political journey, commencing in 1995 as a deputy whip for President Hikepunye Pohamba.

Later, Theo-Ben Gurirab promoted her to deputy speaker and then to Minister of Gender and Child Welfare.

Then I was transferred to the Minister of Labour and back to the Ministry of Gender Equality, Poverty, and Education.

"Therefore, I say everything comes with time. Young people should not get angry. Even if they lose today (at the electoral college), tomorrow they will make it. They should not lose hope," she said.

Several Swapo parliamentarians will not stand for re-election to the party's nominations for the 2025-2029 National Assembly list.

They include Calle Schlettwein, John Mutorwa, Agnes Tjongarero, Peter Katjavivi, Albert Kawana, Juliet Kavetuna.

The party's deputy secretary general Uahekua Herunga confirmed that they wrote to the office of the secretary general that they are not available for reelection.

"They feel that they have sufficiently served the nation and they need to go and rest and give others a chance. Those are some of the reasons," he said.

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Working mothers failed by Namibia's maternity leave policy

Gender activists have expressed concerns about Namibia's maternity leave system, which they claim is failing to support working mothers and violating legal provisions. According to the activists, many women only receive 50% of their basic wage during maternity leave, despite Namibian law entitling them to up to 100% of their monthly salary, capped at N\$15 000.

In addition, the activists are calling for immediate policy reforms to address these disparities, increased awareness of women's legal rights, and stronger enforcement of existing laws to hold employers accountable.

Human rights activist Linda Baumann criticised the current practice, calling it "a glaring injustice" that undermines women's economic empowerment.

"This practice not only violates the law but also unfairly penalises women for becoming mothers, perpetuating economic inequality," she said. Baumann also highlighted that Namibia falls short of international standards set by the International Labour Organization (ILO), which recommends at least 14 weeks of maternity leave with full wage replacement.

"In Namibia, many women are forced to survive on half their basic wage while on maternity leave, creating financial hardships for themselves and their families," she added.

Rosa Namises, another gender equality activist, pointed out that employers often do not register domestic workers and cleaners with the Social Security Commission (SSC), further exacerbating the problem.

"This puts women in vulnerable positions. We need to make sure they are empowered and have clear access to information," Namises said. Namises went on to discuss the wider issue of paternity leave, which Namibia has yet to implement.

"We've been discussing paternity

leave, but it's a complex issue that has yet to be fully addressed. It's something that needs to be brought up again," she said.

Regain Trust Policy and Advocacy Officer, Nsozi Mwazi, has also expressed support for reforms, backing a motion tabled last year by Popular Democratic Movement (PDM) member Winnie Moongo. The motion calls for maternity leave to be increased to five months with full salary pay, along with paternity leave and breastfeeding facilities.

"This aids women's economic empowerment and gender equality," Mwazi said.

Mwazi also criticised the N\$15 000 cap on maternity benefits, saying it unfairly affects higher-earning women.

"This limit discriminates against women who earn above that amount. Mothers end up losing out and would rather use their sick leave days than claim Social Security because it just doesn't help," Mwazi said.

She argued that the system discourages women from pursuing careers if they want to have children. "Women are being forced to choose between motherhood and career progression, and it's contributing to the high number of single-mother households.

Last week, the programme officer at the Namibian Rural Women

Assembly, Toini Amaambo, noted that the disparities between the public and private sectors exacerbate the problem.

"In the public sector, policies are generally clear, but the private sector presents challenges, especially in offering full maternity benefits," Amaambo said.

She also criticised the N\$15 000 cap on maternity benefits, stating it leaves higher earners at a disadvantage.

The issue has gained attention following a letter sent by affirmative repositioning (AR) movement leader Job Amupanda to the minister of gender equality and social welfare on 27 August.

The letter, sent through Kadhila Amoomo Legal Practitioners, challenges the SSC's practice of paying only 50% of the basic wage during maternity leave, claiming it violates the Labour Act 11 of 2007 and the Social Security Act 34 of 1994. "This practice significantly impacts the livelihoods of female employees and amounts to a form of punishment for bringing life into this nation," the letter states.

Amupanda's legal team has called for the ministry to amend what they describe as a "prejudicial policy." Efforts to reach the minister of gender equality and social welfare, Doreen Sioka, for comment were unsuccessful by the time of publication.

Namibia broadens diplomatic ties with seven new countries

Namibia is broadening its international relations by establishing diplomatic ties with seven new nations.

Last week, Minister of Information, Communication, and Technology Emma Theofelus announced Cabinet decisions made at the 15th Cabinet meeting of 2024.

"Cabinet directed the Ministry of International Relations and Cooperation to develop friendly relations and promote economic and political cooperation between the Republic of Namibia and Belize, the Kingdom of Bahrain, the Republic of Tajikistan, the Republic of San Marino, the Principality of Andorra, the Federal Democratic Republic of St. Kitts and Nevis, and the Federal Democratic Republic of Nepal," said Theofelus.

She said the cabinet has approved the establishment of diplomatic relations between the Republic of Namibia and these countries, in accordance with the principles of the United Nations Charter and the provisions of the Vienna Convention on diplomatic relations.

She also announced that the Cabinet has approved the signing of a

memorandum of understanding on cooperation on renewable energy and clean hydrogen between Namibia and the United States of America (USA). Tom Alweendo, the minister of mines and energy, had the authority to sign the agreement.

Theofelus further announced that the Cabinet has also endorsed the outcome of the Vulnerability Assessment and Analysis Integrated Food Security Phase Classification acute food insecurity communication report for 2024/25, which highlights the status of food security, the crop prospects, and the food security and drought situation assessment report of 2024.

This demonstrates that the aggregate cereal production statistics for 2023/2024 recorded 64,600 metric tonnes, compared to 153,00 metric tonnes harvested in the 2022/2023 cropping season.

"This represents a significant decline of 58% in livestock body condition. The livestock body condition ranges between good to poor in most parts of the country and it is anticipated to deteriorate further by October 2024. On water availability, the country's dam level stood at 53.5% as of 8 July, compared to 66.2% during the same period last year," she said.

Nandi-Ndaitwah expressed confidence in Swapo's internal selection process, stating that each delegate had undergone rigorous grooming and was ready for national leadership.

"As a responsible organisation, our party has groomed future leaders over the past 34 years," she said. She highlighted the extensive experience and preparation that Swapo members have undergone, expressing confidence in their readiness for any leadership role within the party and the country.

politics over the past several decades suggests that the Electoral College will be crucial in determining the future leadership of the nation.

"The whole nation is looking at this hall, including the opposition, because they know the government is here, their power is here and the leaders are going to be determined by this forum," she said.

Nangolo Mbumba, a party member and country president, described the role of those who will represent the Swapo in the National Assembly.

"You must work hard to achieve people-centred development and to ensure that we move closer to victory during the second struggle for economic liberation of all Namibians," he said.

He informed the delegate that they must guarantee the party's continued dominance and the election of Nandi-Ndaitwah as the nation's next president.

He also reminds those who will emerge victorious from the POT and become potential candidates for public service. "Namibians want more jobs; they want more business opportunities and housing. They want excellent health

and education. They want to live in a crime-free society. In short, they want successful, prosperous and happy lives. Therefore, they expect from you, as their elected leaders, to provide all these things," he said.

Forever Kavango East governor Samuel Mbambo emphasised the need for leaders in Namibia's National Assembly who are not only representative of the country's diverse society but are also capable of navigating the complexities of a rapidly changing global landscape.

"It is very important to keep that in mind, but also keep in mind the dynamics of our society.

We do have young people, we do have workers, we do have women, and we do have people with disabilities and also the minority people in our community. All those dynamics have to be kept in mind, but on one condition, that those people, irrespective of where they are coming from, must be capable of leading Namibia to the heights in terms of understanding the changing dynamics of the global village," he said.

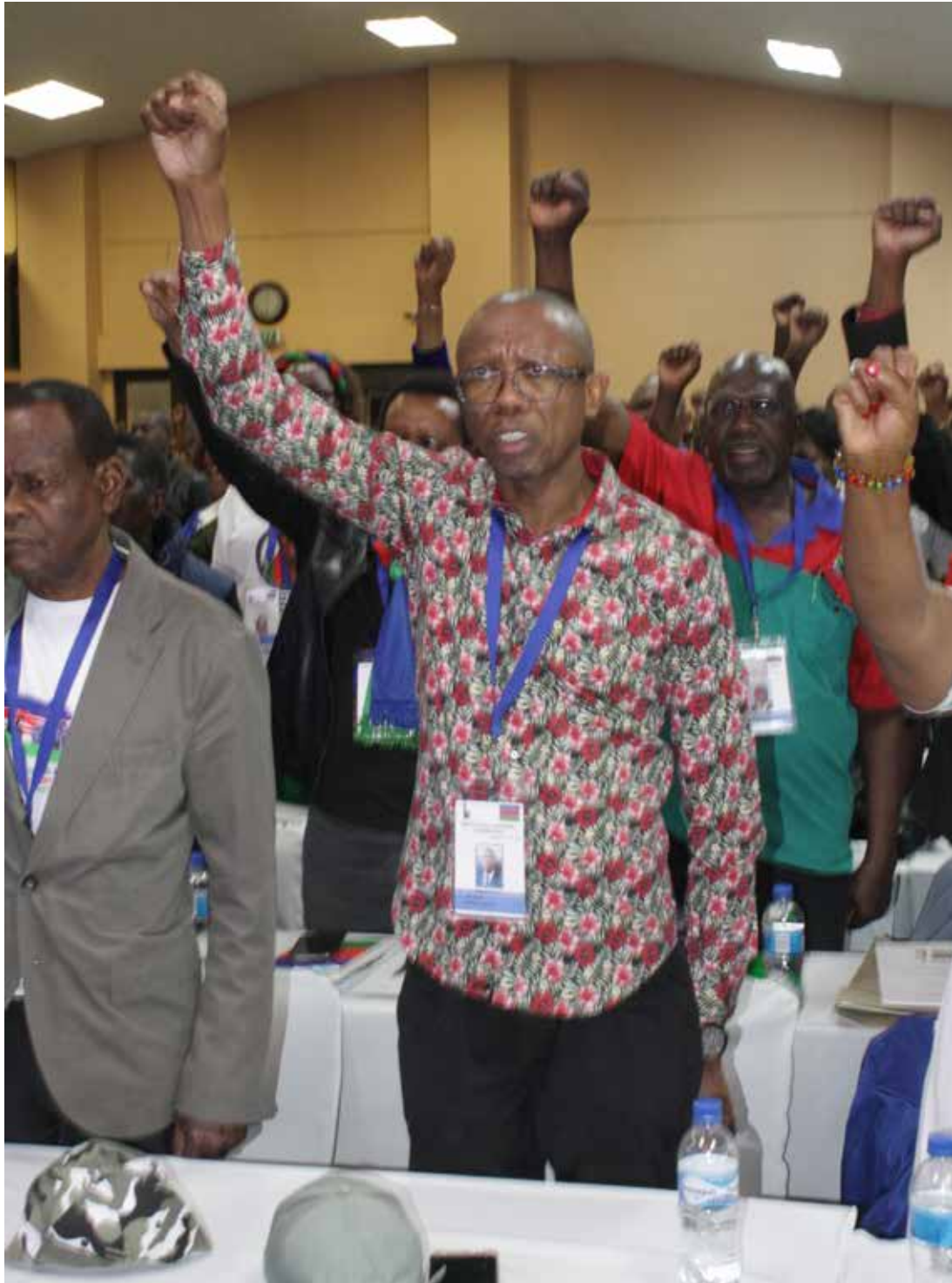

Arandis launches ambitious strategic plan

The Arandis Town Council has launched its 2024-2029 Strategic Plan, unveiling a blueprint aimed at guiding the town toward industrialisation, green hydrogen development, and joint venture participation.

The plan, launched at a special event in Swakopmund last week, is seen as a key instrument to promote sustainable economic growth in the Erongo region.

At the launch, Deputy Minister of Urban and Rural Development, Eveline !Nawases-Taeyele highlighted the town's achievements under its previous strategic plan. She said notable milestones included the construction of 136 houses, innovative solutions to reduce pensioner debt, and the introduction of prepaid water meters.

"These accomplishments demonstrate the council's commitment to development, achieving over 80% of its previous objectives despite challenges like the COVID-19 pandemic," she said. Looking ahead, the town council has set its sights on becoming a hub for green hydrogen production and solar energy, positioning itself as a key player in Namibia's efforts to become a global hydrogen hub.

The council is collaborating with

Cleanergy Namibia to establish a large-scale solar and green hydrogen production facility, which is expected to create local employment, reduce the town's dependency on mining, and contribute significantly to the national economy. Arandis mayor Risto Kapenda stressed

the town's strategy to diversify its economy beyond its roots as a mining town. "By providing services to the surrounding industries and optimising land use, the council aims to attract investments and generate additional revenue," he said.

The chief executive officer, Stanley Norris, reiterated this approach, stressing the importance of leveraging land as a key driver for job creation and municipal service enhancement. The new strategic plan also includes ambitious industrial development targets and improvements to the

town's logistical infrastructure, further cementing Arandis as a critical player in Namibia's sustainable development efforts. "Through these initiatives, the town council aims to pave the way for a future of economic resilience and innovation," Norris said.



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Africa's largest desalination plant will be built in Namibia

The China General Nuclear Power Group (CGN) has committed to building Africa's largest desalination plant in Namibia after an agreement in this regard was signed between Namibia and China.

The project expected to significantly alleviate the country's water shortages

With construction set to begin later this year, the plant, located in the Erongo region, is poised to deliver up to 25 million cubic metres of desalinated water annually upon completion in 2026.

The agreement was reached after Calle Schlettwein, the minister of agriculture, water and land reform, announced that the Namibian government gave the go-ahead to construct a second desalination plant in the Erongo region, with a production capacity between 20 and 25 million cubic meters in June this year.

The new facility will address the growing demand for fresh water in Namibia, particularly in the arid central and western coastal areas, where water shortages have long impeded industrial growth and agriculture.

It is especially critical as the country's

current freshwater sources, such as the Omaruru and Kuiseb aquifers and the Orano desalination plant, have reached their sustainable limits. These sources currently supply up to 30 million cubic metres per year, falling short of Namibia's projected future needs as population growth and industrial activities intensify. This joint venture with CGN is part of the broader China-Namibia Belt and Road Initiative, a strategic

partnership designed to boost infrastructure and economic development across Namibia. The agreement between CGN and the Namibian government to build the desalination plant was not specifically mentioned as having been reached at the 2024 Forum on China-Africa Cooperation (FOCAC) Summit in Beijing. However, the summit, which took place from September 4 to 6,

2024, focused on strengthening cooperation between China and African countries, and such infrastructure projects often fall under the umbrella of initiatives discussed at FOCAC.

The desalination project is part of the broader China-Namibia Belt and Road Initiative, which aligns with FOCAC's goals of boosting Africa's infrastructure and industrial development.

This initiative stresses the shared vision of addressing water scarcity in Namibia, particularly in arid regions and supporting economic growth in industries like mining.

The collaboration will not only provide long-term solutions for water scarcity but will also create jobs, stimulate industrial expansion, and secure water supplies for mining operations, which play a crucial role in the country's economy.

The Husab Mine, Namibia's largest uranium mine and another CGN investment contributed approximately N\$8.6 billion to Namibia's gross domestic product last year.

In addition to ensuring water supply for Namibia's coastal regions, there are plans to eventually extend the plant's capacity to serve the interior, including major cities like Windhoek.

The Namibian government has stressed that this project is vital for enhancing the country's resilience to droughts, with the next phase of construction slated for January 2025.

Once operational by early 2027, the plant will join Namibia's other desalination initiatives in securing a stable water supply to support the nation's economic growth, while also serving the broader Southern African region.

China commits N\$1 billion to build housing for NamPol

Chinese President Xi Jinping has committed N\$1 billion to assist the Namibian government in building houses for police officers.

Namibian presidency press secretary, Alfredo Hengari said this over the weekend while providing an update on President Nangolo Mbumba's recent visit to China.

Hengari said the Chinese leader pledged this during the bilateral talks with Mbumba at the side of the 2024 Summit of the 9th Forum on China-Africa Cooperation in Beijing, China. "During the talks, President Xi also availed close to N\$500 million in grants for future projects.

Additionally, the government of China committed close to N\$50 million worth of assistance to augment the efforts of the Namibian government toward drought relief," said Hengari. He added that Jinping also told the Namibian delegate that the project would send a technical team to Namibia to conduct feasibility studies. Jinping also applauded Mbumba for the steady leadership he had provided to the Namibians following the death of President Hage Geingob in February.

Hengari added that during the meeting, Mbumba informed his Chinese counterpart that Namibia wants to work closely with China to develop green hydrogen, solar manufacturing, hydro, wind, and nuclear energy.

Mbumba also told Jinping

that Namibia wants to scale up infrastructure, including a desalination plant and nuclear infrastructure, to add value to uranium for the peaceful development of nuclear energy and other energy sources, said Hengari.

"Moreover, President Mbumba said that the Namibian government was seeking cooperation with China to ensure national safety through the implementation of technology-based smart cities," said Hengari. He also announced that President Mbumba will highlight Namibia's efforts to establish agro-processing centres, particularly in rural areas, for youth, cooperatives, and farmers in general.

Underscoring the need to source technologies from China to add value to agricultural produce, develop new products, contribute to economic activities in remote areas, and stimulate economic growth.

Jinping, on the other hand, told the African leaders at the summit that China is ready to increase exchanges of governance experience with Africa. This, he said, will be done by supporting all countries in exploring modernisation paths befitting their national conditions and helping ensure equal rights and equal opportunities for all.

"China is ready to deepen cooperation with Africa in industry, agriculture, infrastructure, trade and investment, promote exemplary, high-quality Belt and Road cooperation projects, and build together a model for the delivery of the Global Development Initiative," said Jinping.

He also pledged his country's willingness to collaborate with Africa to promote personal training, poverty reduction, and employment, enhancing the people's sense of gain, happiness, and security.

Jinping added that his country is ready to help Africa build "green growth engines," to narrow the gap in energy accessibility.

He added that he would encourage companies from his country to invest in Africa's pharmaceutical production.

"We support the development of the Africa Centres for Disease Control and Prevention to strengthen public health capacity in all African countries," he said.

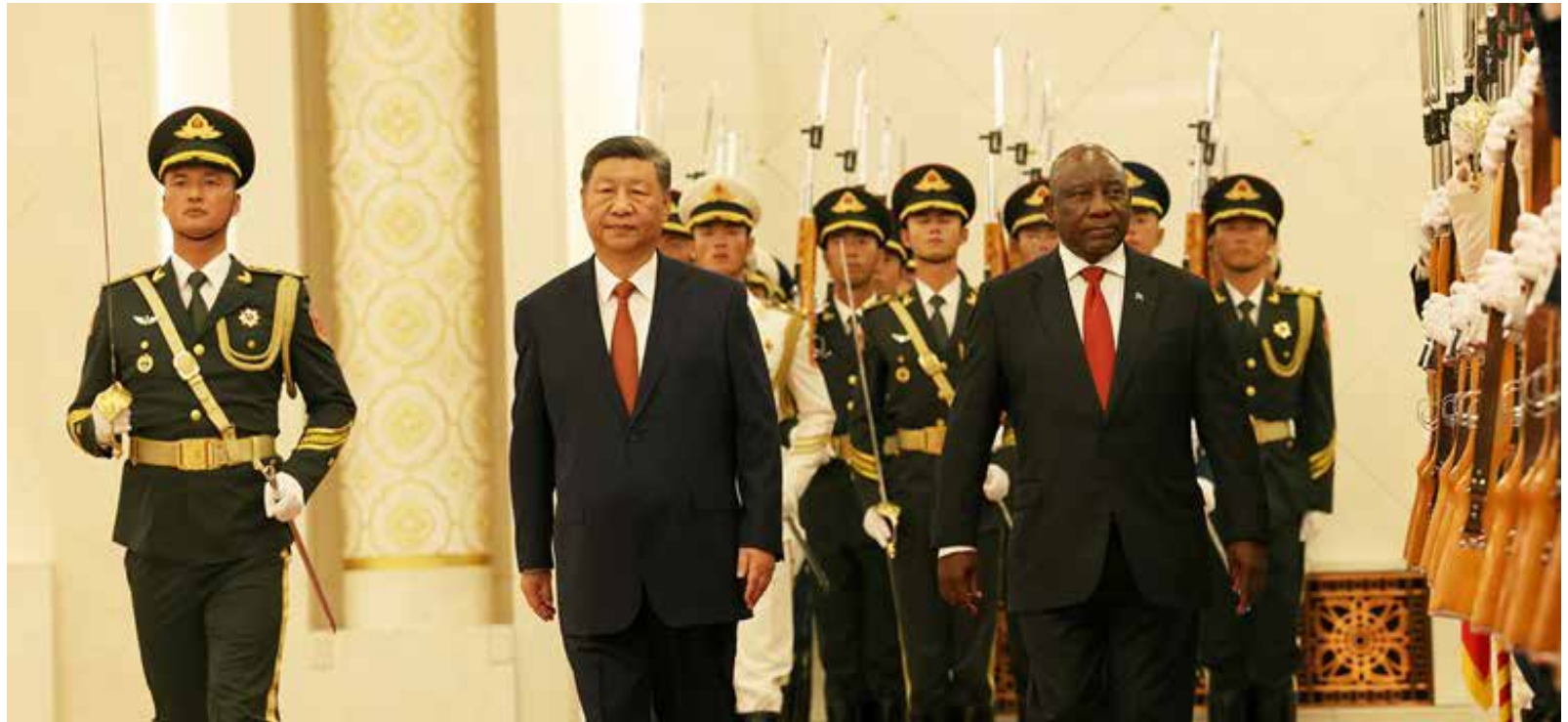

international organizations attending the summit gathered for group photos at the Great Hall of the People. In his speech entitled “Joining Hands to Advance Modernization and Build a Community with a Shared Future,” Xi at first extended a warm welcome to the foreign guests attending the summit on behalf of the Chinese government and people.

“Blossoms in spring turn into fruits in autumn, and a bumper harvest is the reward of hard work. In this season of harvest, I am delighted to gather together with so many old and new friends in Beijing to discuss grand plans for China-Africa friendship and cooperation in the new era. First of all, on behalf of the Chinese government and people, I hereby extend a warm welcome to you all,” he said.

'Hell behind bars' - life in DR Congo's most notorious jail

In attempting to describe Makala Prison - the scene of a deadly and failed breakout this week in the Democratic Republic of Congo - two people who have been inside used the exact same word: "hell".

"Makala is a true hell," Stanis Bujakera, a former inmate and journalist, told the BBC about DR Congo's largest jail.

Bujakera was sent to the notorious Makala Prison in September last year, after the authorities accused him of writing an article that alleged the military were involved in an opposition politician's death. He spent six months there.

"Makala is not a prison, but a detention centre resembling a concentration camp, where people are sent to die," he said.

The prison, located in capital city Kinshasa, has a capacity of 1,500 prisoners but is estimated to hold around 10 times more.

This cramped population ranges from petty criminals to political prisoners to murderers.

Human rights groups have long complained of the dire conditions Makala inmates face, including overcrowding, unsubstantial food and poor access to clean water.

Following a disaster at the facility earlier this week, these conditions have been thrust into the spotlight once again.

After masses of inmates tried to break out of Makala in the early hours of Monday morning, 129 prisoners lost their lives, Interior Minister Jacquemain Shabani said. Two dozen were shot dead as they tried to escape, Mr Shabani reported, but most were suffocated in a crush.

Four surviving inmates told the New York Times that prior to the escape attempt, prisoners had been held in stifling cells without running water or the electricity to power fans for more than a day-and-a-half.

Some prisoners had initially broken out to escape the heat, they said. Bujakera said these conditions were far from unusual - taps "constantly" run dry at Makala, while "electricity is random, leaving the detainees without light for days on end".

"Inmates are literally abandoned to their fate, exposed to overcrowded and unsanitary conditions that foster contamination and the spread of disease," he added.

Prisoners die "every day" as a result, Bujakera said.

Rostin Manketa, executive director of Congolese human rights group La Voix des Sans Voix, shares a similar account.

He has visited Makala several times and concluded that when a person has been sent to Makala Prison, "it seems like [they] have been sent to hell". Stark videos filmed by Bujakera during his time in Makala show dozens of sleeping men, packed tightly together on the floor of an overflowing room. Their limbs overlap, and in a delicate balancing act some men sleep atop the walls that divide shower stalls.

Conditions are better in Makala's VIP section, a separate pavilion that only the minority can afford. You get a bed and more space, for example. Bujakera was asked to pay \$3,000 (£2,280) to stay in VIP, but he managed to get this price slashed to \$450 (£340) for his stay.

He told the BBC: "Economic inequalities between inmates create a hierarchy... the poorest are abandoned to their fate."

What is more, wardens at Makala have little presence. Law and order inside the prison is effectively delegated to the inmates themselves.

"Prisoners govern themselves," Fred Bauma, a human rights activist who was incarcerated in Makala from

March 2015 to August 2016, told BBC's Focus on Africa podcast this week.

"It's like you've changed countries and there's a new government and you need to learn those rules."

This system of self-government is dysfunctional and leads to "harmful power dynamics, acts of violence and conflicts between inmates", Bujakera said.

But Makala is not alone with its abysmal conditions - prisons all over the country are chronically underfunded and overcrowded.

According to the World Prison Brief project, DR Congo's jails are the sixth-most overcrowded globally.

The authorities have acknowledged this problem on a number of occasions. Following Monday's jailbreak, Deputy Justice Minister Samuel Mbemba blamed magistrates for prison overcrowding, noting that "even mere suspects are sent to prison".

Many inmates have not actually been sentenced for a crime but are instead held in jail for months - or years - while waiting to be tried.

The food in DR Congo's prisons has also been criticised widely.

In Makala, inmates get only one meal per day - and this dish is often of limited nutritional value.

Pictures taken by Bujakera show a tub of maize meal - a staple carbohydrate in DR Congo - turned hard and dry, accompanied by a watery brown vegetable stew.

In order to avoid malnourishment, many prisoners rely on their relatives to bring food in to them. However, not everyone has these connections.

In 2017, a charity reported that at least 17 prisoners starved to death following food shortages in Makala.

It is "possible" that Makala's testing environment led to the tragic attempt to escape, Mr Manketa said.

He argues that to avoid a repeat, the authorities should build new prisons and improve existing ones. Bujakera, who is now based in the United States, said this change must happen swiftly.

It is a "sick" justice system, he lamented, and as Monday's disaster demonstrated, people are dying while waiting for a cure.

A possible re-run for Presidency after November elections

As Namibia approaches the 27 November elections, the question for a rerun of the presidential race is critical. This is possible since more votes might be split amongst political parties and independent candidates—those who stood on their own.

The establishment of political parties such as the Independent Patriots for Change, IPC (a threat not only to SWAPO but other opposition political parties) and Affirmative Repositioning, AR, and independent candidates have brought yet another new political concept to the Namibian political system.

SWAPO was more on a safer chance of winning elections without the existence of IPC and AR. The establishment of the two political parties compromised both the Presidential and National Assembly race for SWAPO. This might result in no candidate obtaining more than 50 percent of the total votes to be cast as required by the Namibian Constitution.

Article 28 (b) of the Namibian Constitution states that: “If no person shall be elected as President unless he or she [has] received more than fifty (50) percent of the valid votes cast and [the necessary number of ballots shall be conducted until such result is reached] if no candidate received more than fifty (50) percent of the votes, a second ballot shall be conducted in which the two (2) candidates who have received the most votes in the previous ballot shall participate and the candidate who received the most votes in the second ballot shall be duly elected.”

Discussions surrounding the South African way of a coalition government has been ongoing now for a while. However, even if no candidate scores more than 50 percent, this won't materialize as the Namibian Constitution declared a different approach, as outlined in the above-mentioned Article. This is the reason, there may be a rerun for the Presidential race after the November elections.

The earlier the better. It might be wise for the Electoral Commission of Namibia (ECN) to have additional resources ready in case such an incident happens.

It is no secret that more voters have given up on many of the opposition political parties that have been in existence of political systems before the establishment of IPC and AR. This is due to their weakness to challenge the ruling party for more than 30 years of Independence.

IPC and AR bring another level of



mind changes in the way people will decide to choose leaders in November, meaning another reason for more votes to be shared amongst the two political entities, bringing down the long-existing political parties, yet possibly not obtain the required winning percentages.

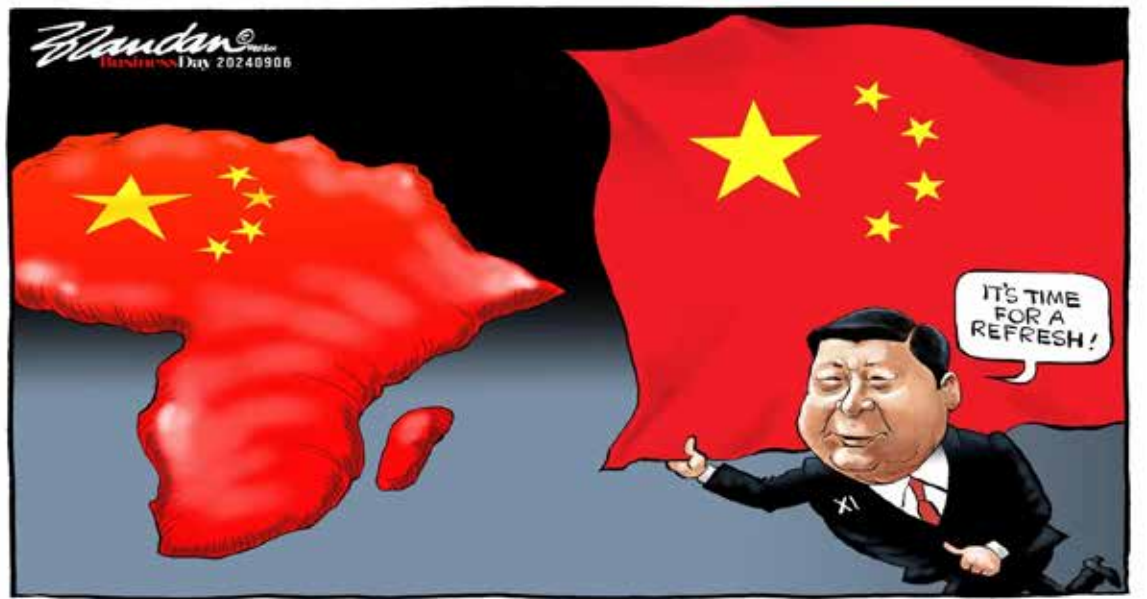
Politically, IPC and SWAPO earn more chances to win the November elections, yet, the two parties' support is based-influenced by other political parties such as the Landless People's Movement (LPM), Popular Democratic Movement (PDM) and AR. Furthermore, the deregistration of Namibia Economic Freedom Fighters (NEFF) and the Christian Democratic Voice (CDV) parties adds another political consequence.

It is also quite interesting to note that SWAPO has lost support after the party expelled Dr. Panduleni Itula, who has shaken the political system for the considerable first time in the history of Namibia when he stood as an independent candidate in the 2019 Presidential and National Assembly elections.

Additionally, some people are of the view that it is too early for Namibia to be headed by a female president. Female leaders are more likely to be suitable for the developed countries. It is also an African concept and culture that men are more naturally suitable for leadership of the highest level like heading the Presidency. All these analyses add to the rerun of the presidential race.

Let us be ready for whatever comes from the upcoming elections. Watch this space!

Reduction of wages can only be done by consensus

The fear of employers reducing the wages of employees amid the new national wage structure is rising but such changes could only be affected after an agreement was reached between workers' unions and individual employers.

Job Munairo the general secretary of the National Union of Namibian Workers (NUNW), said the normal practice as per the law before any employer decides to cut employees salaries is still in effect.

He said this last week while responding to questions sent to him by the Windhoek Observer.

He said employers ought to first notify the labour commission or the union about their intention to cut workers' salaries.

The labour commission will then request such an employer to open their books for investigation before approving such a request.

"No employer is allowed to cut employees' salaries just like that, they must provide us with their reason such as financial constraints or restructuring. And, should any employer go ahead without this restructuring, the law is clear and they will be dealt with accordingly," he said. Munairo further explained there is no panic at the moment, and he remains optimistic that employers will abide by the law.

"During COVID-19 was the only time some companies reduced salaries of their workers, but that was done procedurally and all parties agreed," he said.

of the Metal and Allied Namibia Workers (MAN), said that there hasn't been any case of an employer cutting employees' salaries wrongfully so far. "Even during Covid-19 when some workers' salaries were reduced, it was only in some sectors and it was communicated beforehand. The construction sector was not affected. It had an increment that really good year," she pointed out.

Jonas said that until recently, Namibia had no national minimum wage. That was until the minimum wage of N\$18 per hour policy that comes into effect next year in January was announced

recently.

As a result, the new wage policy was gazetted this year and it is aligned with the required payment per hour by the ministry of labour.

Despite these concerns, she said the union remains optimistic that employers will follow the law and she does not anticipate any issues in that regard.

"The law is clear, and should we have such a case, the law will take its course and the guilty party will be punished," she cautioned.

Jonas stated that an employer must first notify both the representative

of the employees and the labour commission before cutting a worker's salary.

Fears started rising after the deputy finance minister, Maureen Hinda-Mbuende made a call for severe punishment of employers who reduce employees' salaries without their consent.

She said during an interview with the *Windhoek Observer* last week such employers must be brought to book and face the full wrath of the law.

Her call comes after public concerns

about employers who might be tempted to use unscrupulous tactics to avoid paying employees salaries, following the new minimum wage structure for Namibia set at N\$18 per hour that will come into effect in 2025. "We all have an obligation to sustain peace and security and to contribute to the economic growth of the country. Being fair to your employers should be a modus operandi, that we pay fair wages," she said. She said the government should not need to regulate wages if the philosophy of the country is of a mindset that fair wages are being paid to workers. With regards to the minimum wage,

she said even the person who was getting paid a little bit more, finds their salaries being reduced. "I think it should actually be ruled illegal and fraudulent if any employer reduces employees' wages. Because you cannot just reduce my salary, why must the farm workers' salary be reduced," she argued. She stated that it should be understood that the new minimum wage, is to help those that are earning below the breadline and to assist them to earn better wages. She encouraged the public to assist anybody whose salary has been reduced, be it a domestic worker, be it a cleaner, be it a farm worker, be it a clerk, or those affected by

the minimum wages that have been established. She explained that such a person has a labour case to report, and it will be obligatory for the ministry of labour to hear such a case. "Because packages cannot be reduced, even if you are demoted or a victim of restructuring because your cost of living does not get reduced," she said. Labour expert, Herbert Jauch said the Labour Act states very clearly that nobody can change conditions of employment unilaterally. Therefore, any employer reducing wages without the prior agreement of the worker concerned commits an unfair labour practice. The head labour inspector in the

country, Shou-Henok Amukwa said the ministry has not received any cases of wage reduction so far. He stated that any employer who reduces employees' wages without reason will be dealt with by the law. "Let me clarify something, reduction of wages ought to be communicated to all parties and the labour commission is mandated to approve such reduction only when the evidence submitted warrants such a reduction after a thorough investigation," he explained. Amukwa explained that all cases concerning wage cuts are investigated and only after investigations can they determine the force of action to be taken. "Based on this it is fair to confirm that

we haven't had a scenario where wages were cut with no reason. It is our call to the public that if anyone thinks their wage was cut without their concern countrywide. To come and see us so we can look into it," he said. Amukwa firmly believes that the laws put in place are sufficient to bring to book those who contravene the labour law and people should report such cases. "The one scenario I can share with you is when an employer decides not to pay an employee for the days that they were not at work. This is within the employer's right. However, if there is a dispute, then both parties can approach an arbitrator to find a solution," he explained.

Tasty, nutritious beans come in many forms

Beans originated in Central and South America and have been domesticated for thousands of years, says Bill Kerr.

There are beans for everyone.

Some are more suitable for home gardens and small farms, and then there are those conventional types that we all know and which are well suited for growing as important commercial crops.

The common bean, of the genus *Phaseolus vulgaris*, comes in many forms and is still evolving at the hands of plant breeders who tweak varieties for improved appearance, yield, and uniformity of maturity to enable mechanical harvesting and disease resistance.

In South Africa, most of the types are dwarf beans for fresh harvest and dry beans like sugar beans, haricot beans used for baked beans, and kidney beans.

Green beans used to have strings, which had to be removed before cooking. I still remember having to remove these strings for my mother as a child.

Stringless variety

The first stringless variety of the green bean was bred more than a century ago, but the string gene sometimes still manifests in a single plant from time to time.

When I was breeding beans, I omitted to check every selection for strings as they occurred so seldom. I had developed a wonderful variety, but when it was pure, I found that it was not stringless and had to discard it.

I still occasionally hear old-timers talking of beans as string beans. It was only when I became a commercial farmer that stringless varieties started to become available in South Africa.

Fresh market beans come in many different colours, with green being most popular and yellow following far behind. The latter are referred to as wax beans.

There are also speckled, black and purple varieties. The darker-green the bean is, the better it is from a marketing perspective, but this was not always so. For a time after dark varieties started appearing on the shelves, some buyers avoided them, thinking they were thawed frozen beans.

This is no longer the case. Straight, thin, longer, dark-green beans are now more popular.

Climbing varieties

Climbing bean varieties, also referred to as runner or pole beans, are mostly confined to home gardens. The varieties available in South Africa are not that good compared with some available overseas. They are only planted on a limited scale here due to the cost of labour required.

In Taiwan, climbing beans are widely planted in winter, and in summer when it is too hot, growers plant yardlong beans (*Vigna unguiculata*) using the same poles. Many pole bean varieties are long, flat-podded, tender and delicious.

When to pick beans

Commercial beans are allowed to develop to their maximum size while still marketable, as this enables more beans to be harvested at the same time, saving the grower money. However, the opposite is desirable for the home garden: you want to pick the pods as young as possible for tenderness, taste, and nutritional value. In the process, you extend the harvest period and increase total yield.

between half an acre and around five acres, but for more than that, you'll need a tractor. You can easily grow your own veg, plant a few fruit trees and keep a few chickens on a quarter of an acre. 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James Matthews: the rebel writer who was South Africa's voice of resistance

World renowned South African poet James Matthews has died at 95. His was the last great voice of an era of writers who worked against South Africa's repressive and racist system of apartheid, which resulted in him being relentlessly harassed, detained by police and his work banned.

Schooled in District Six, an area of Cape Town where black people were forcibly removed to make way for white development, he was most famous for his poems. But he was also a journalist, cultural worker, short story writer, novelist, proponent of the Black Consciousness movement and a one-man cultural institution who never stopped speaking truth to power, even after the country's first democratic elections in 1994. Hein Willemse is an esteemed literature scholar who was a friend of Matthews and who wrote a book on him. He explains why the death of this remarkable man is such a great loss.

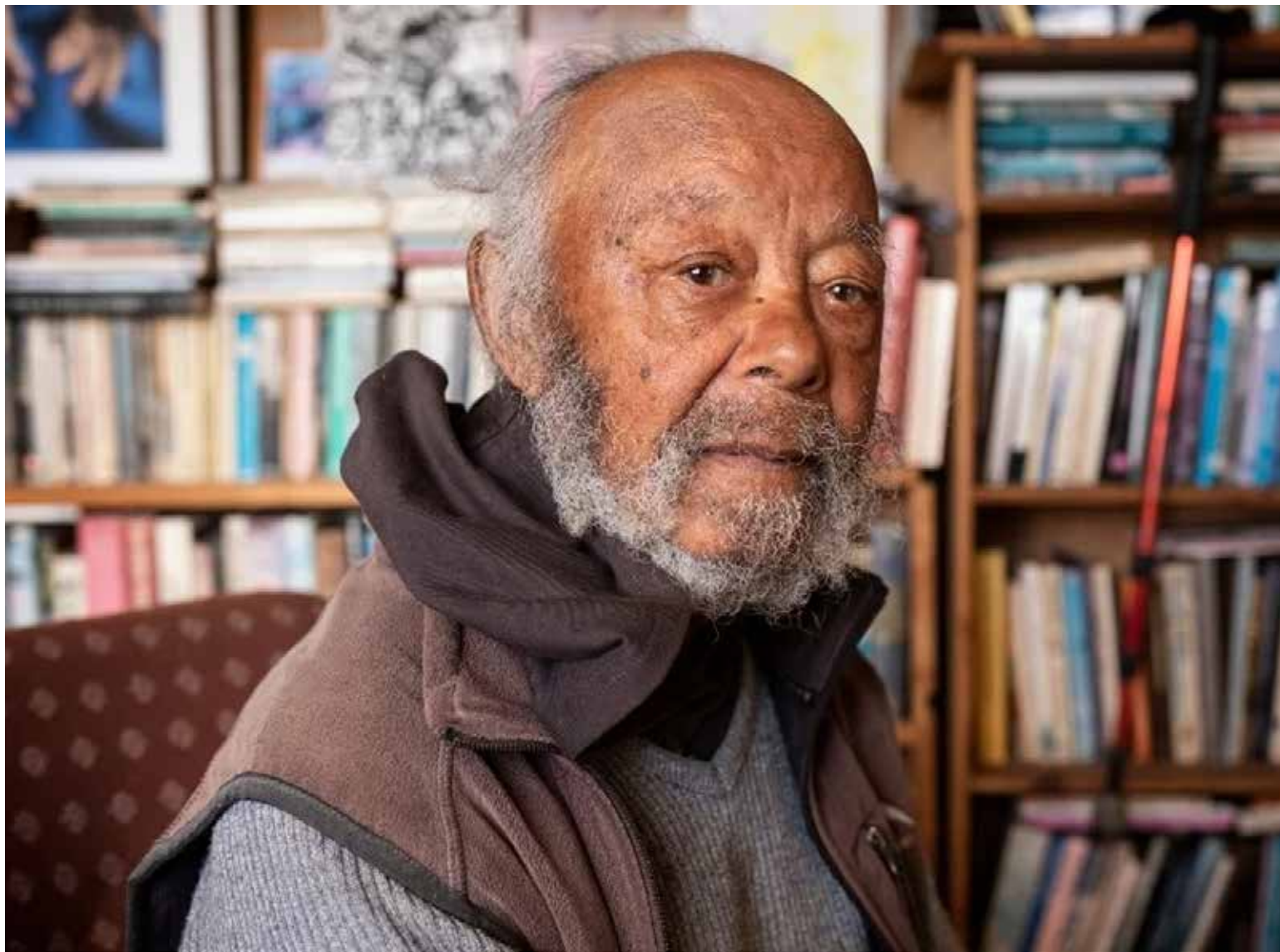
Who was James Matthews?

James was born on 24 May 1929 in the Bo-Kaap district of Cape Town, the eldest of six children. He attended school in District Six. He worked various menial jobs. One was as a messenger running errands, what was called an "office boy". He was later employed as an editorial clerk and telephonist at the Cape Times newspaper. He also worked as a reporter for the legendary black South African newspaper Golden City Post in Johannesburg, and later wrote for Muslim News, under the editorship of Imam Abdullah Haron, one of the first anti-apartheid activists to have died in police custody in 1969.

Even as a young boy, James was always interested in writing. Some of his teachers noted his talent and even encouraged him. Even though he left school prematurely, midway through high school, his passion endured. Matthews published his first story in a Cape Town newspaper, *The Sun*, at the age of 17 and from then on there was no turning back.

Initially, he wrote short stories and published these in various magazines such as *Hi-Note* and *Drum*, as well as in a collection called *Quartet* (1963), edited by celebrated South African writer Richard Rive. His collection of short stories *Azikwelwa* (1962) was published overseas. It was later republished locally as *The Park* and other stories (1983). He published an autobiographical novel, *The Party is Over* (1997), initially published in 1986 in German.

From the 1970s onwards, James almost exclusively concentrated on writing poetry. Today he is known mostly as the poet who published collections such as *Cry Rage* (1972),

Pass me a Meatball, Jones (1977), *No Time for Dreams* (1981) and *Poisoned Wells and Other Delights* (1990). Dissidence and political militancy, infused with the self-awareness of Black Consciousness characterise his earlier poetry. Today we think of James Matthews as an important politically committed writer, especially during the time of political and social oppression in South Africa. His was the persistent voice of political liberation, and freedom of expression. He did not want to be hamstrung by authoritarian political forces, and he abhorred apartheid intensely.

What forces shaped his career? I think the most important force in his writing career must have been the apartheid strictures forced on black people. One must remember that apartheid not only divided people into social groupings, limiting their potential. It also forced them from their land and homes, impoverished them, and destroyed their neighbourhoods, creating the fiction of them as lesser people. Matthews almost intuitively confronted this inhumanity. In the late-1960s he found the

liberation movement and philosophy Black Consciousness very attractive, especially its core tenets of self-reliance, self-worth and its stress on the commonality of all oppressed people in the country. His words and his opposition to apartheid landed him in the cross hairs of the apartheid government. For some time he could not travel internationally. The government banned his books and he was detained for extended periods on several occasions. His post-1994 poetry focuses primarily on the social issues that concerned him: poverty, exclusion, the unfulfilled dreams and the politics of racial and social exclusion practiced by the new government, its excesses, xenophobia. And, inevitably, ageing and death, as evidenced in his *Flames and Flowers* (2000), *Age is a Beautiful Phase* (2008) and *Gently Stirs my Soul* (2015).

What works or achievements particularly stand out for you?

James was an extraordinary, driven person, a non-conformist who would not allow restrictive norms to hem him in. That trait often landed

him in hot water even among his friends. When used positively it led to significant cultural moments. For instance he established the first black-owned art gallery in Cape Town, in the suburb of Athlone. His publishing house *Blac* published his own work and that of other writers. In old age he often presented poetry writing classes to learners and university students around the country. I think one must view James' work as a writer's perspective on a particular environment and each of his works, his collections of poetry, speaks to a South African historical moment. I prefer to look at the whole, the impact of his oeuvre. He was recognised internationally quite early on in his career. In the US he was awarded the *Woza Afrika* Award (1978), drafted onto the *Kwaza Honours List* (1979), and awarded a Fellowship in Writing to the University of Iowa in the US. In Germany he received the *Freedom of two cities – Lehrte and Nuremberg*. But only in the democratic era did he receive honorary doctorates and awards in South Africa. In 2004 he was awarded the *National Order of Ikhamanga* for:

his excellent achievements in literature, contributing to journalism, and his inspirational commitment to the struggle for a non-racial South Africa. In 2022 the Department of Arts and Culture recognised him as "A Living Human Legend".

How should Matthews be remembered?

Culturally, his death represents the end of an era. James has been a literary and cultural institution in Cape Town, an icon. There is even a mural commemorating his presence in one of the main thoroughfares in the city. In South African literature he is part of a generation of pioneering black writers who truly established a tradition of resistance writing in the 1950s, 1960s and 1970s. His works were among the first to be banned by the apartheid government, and he was an important voice of dissidence during a very difficult time in the country. Internationally he has been recognised as a person of extraordinary courage and honoured for his consistent commitment to the values of justice and humanity. - *The Conversation*



Prince Harry

Prince Harry to inherit millions from trust set up by Queen, when he turns 40

Prince Harry is reportedly set to inherit £8 million from the late Queen Mother when he turns 40.

The Duke of Sussex will celebrate the milestone on September 15, and it is thought his grandmother, the late Queen Elizabeth, started collecting a huge trust fund for him when he was aged 10.

At the time, the Queen Mother, who was then 94, apparently put aside a tax-free £19 million to leave to her great-grandchildren, according to The Times.

The newspaper added the inheritances were divided into two instalments – one to be given to Princes William and Harry when they turned 21, and another on their 40th birthdays.

A former palace aide told The Times: “There was a trust fund set up at the time.

It was a way in which the Queen Mother could set aside money for

when her great-grandchildren were older and a way of passing a slice of her estate down in a tax-efficient way. “It was a way in which some of her estate could be ring-fenced for them.” Sources added Harry may have been left more money than his older brother William, 42, in the inheritance. Insiders say it is due to the fact the Queen Mother assumed William would get a larger fortune from the Duchy of Cornwall as Britain’s future heir.

William became Duke of Cornwall when he was made Prince of Wales after King Charles’ coronation, and is estimated to have got a £23.6 million fortune by inheriting the estate. When the Queen Mother died in 2002 aged 101, a statement from Buckingham Palace said: “Queen Elizabeth The Queen Mother has bequeathed her entire estate (which mainly comprises the contents of her houses) to The Queen.-iol

Judge refuses to reopen Alex Baldwin’s criminal trial over shooting on ‘Rust’ set

The judge in Alec Baldwin’s criminal trial has denied a motion to revive the case.

The 66-year-old actor was standing trial in July over the death of Halyna Hutchins - who was fatally shot on the set of ‘Rust’ in 2021 - when Judge Mary Marlowe Sommer dismissed the case after his legal team argued prosecutors had hidden evidence relating to the passing of the cinematographer, and Judge Mary Marlowe Sommer has now denied a motion from the prosecution to revive the case.

Special prosecutor Kari T Morrissey recently requested that the case be reconsidered. However, Judge Sommer has dismissed the request, noting that the motion exceeded a ten-page limit on briefs filed without permission.

In a statement given to PEOPLE, Morrissey - who was accused of direct involvement in the decision to

withhold evidence - subsequently said: “The ten-page motion has already been filed. I cannot comment beyond that.”

Baldwin was indicted by a New Mexico grand jury in January after the gun he was holding during a 2021 rehearsal on the set of ‘Rust’ discharged, killing Hutchins and injuring the film’s director, Joel Souza.

The Hollywood star has subsequently maintained that he didn’t pull the trigger of the gun or know why it contained live ammunition.

Hannah Gutierrez-Reed, the film’s armorer, was jailed for 18 months in April after being found guilty of charges connected to the incident. ‘Rust’ resumed filming and finished its shoot in May 2023, saying in an Instagram post marking its completion: “It’s been a long and difficult road. But we reach the end of the trail today.”

Siya Kolisi's captain's innings with a broken nose epitomises Springboks' never-say-die attitude

The Springboks exploits over the last two weeks against the All Blacks in the Rugby Championship have been the most extraordinary show of heart and desire to find a way to win.

Of course, we already witnessed it at the Rugby World Cup last year, when they won their quarter-final, semi-final and final by one point to lift the crown for a fourth time.

The All Blacks were up by 10 points at Ellis Park and lost. They had a six-point half-time buffer at the Cape Town Stadium and lost. On both occasions they had the Boks on the ropes, possibly even with a knee on the canvas.

But when you have this Springboks team down, you have to make sure they are dead, dead. Because, if they have a pulse, they will fight until the

bitter end.

And nobody epitomised that warriors spirit more than captain Siya Kolisi on Saturday at Cape Town's magnificent sporting venue. Playing with a broken nose after making himself available "for the most important game after the World Cup", the captain had to stand up and lead by example. And lead, he did.

Kolisi produced an action-packed display, with big hits and support runs, which was rewarded with a try that swung the momentum in the match in the Springboks' favour. When he was substituted in the second half, he received the deafening cheer from the Mother City faithful. Before the match Kolisi talked about how they wanted to win back the Freedom Cup, which has been in the hands of the All Blacks for the

past 15 years. It's the only piece of silverware this golden generation of Springboks haven't "touched".

In the end, they lifted the cup with fireworks and streamers that capped off a glorious night in Cape Town. "We all wanted this game, and we all know how big it was," Kolisi said. "The coach gave me his trust when I said I was okay, and I needed to prove that to him. I couldn't be half-hearted.

"No one is going to celebrate you when you're half-hearted because I know there's Kwagga Smith and Marco van Staden, along with other guys who would want this opportunity.

"We needed it today and, even though we didn't start the way we wanted to start, the coach was quite honest with us [before] the second

half.

"We did exactly what we wanted, and the subs did what they always do. This game was big and, after the World Cup final, this was the biggest game for us as this group."

It was the fourth successive win by the Springboks over the All Blacks – and their fourth win in a row in as many games in the Rugby Championship.

The Springboks are now on the brink of winning their first ever full-fixture Rugby Championship with two matches against Argentina away and at home to come. The Boks won the trophy in 2019, but it was an abbreviated version because of the Rugby World Cup in Japan
